PROJECTS

Florian's District <u>Grant Seeds to Table</u> continues to move forward successfully. The kids are planting the gardens in spite of less than perfect weather. A little rain doesn't slow down these young learners. We never get to see Florian in the wonderful pictures from this project....he's always behind the camera.

And in Celuk, a few changes in direction were required after the death of the husband leaving his elderly wife to manage on her own. The two piglets turned out to be difficult to care for and will be sold. Proceeds from their sale will purchase additional white chickens and chicken feed. The eggs are selling well at the market and white chickens are always in demand for ceremonial needs.

At last Jeni's gorgeous DAP funded book, <u>Ocean Champions</u>, has arrived from the printers. Jeni brought copies for us to ogle over and distribution to schools and libraries has already begun. Marilyn lucked out and took 18 copies home for elementary schools in Puhu and for local kindergarten teachers who want to read the books aloud to their little ones. Thanks to the Australian Consulate's Direct Aid Program for funding this project!

Pres Erika visited <u>Permaculture Black Gold Foundation</u> in Ubud. Their emphasis is on applying and teaching the three tenets of permaculture: Care for the earth, Care for the people and Fair share.

LOMBOK

Dr. Patrick M reported on what he's encountered while working on Lombok. The situation remains very serious. There are 559 reported deaths but that count excludes unidentified bodies. It could be double the reported number. Almost 78,000 houses are gone leaving over 390,000 homeless.

One hundred ShelterBoxes are now arriving on the island and each ShelterBox can house six people. The box comes with supplies such as blankets, tools and a water purification kit. Top priorities for distribution are women with children, pregnant women and the elderly.

Another promising possibility for housing replacement comes from a private business, AB6. Their plan is to build a simple house for IDR six million at the rapid rate of 10 houses per day. Discussions between AB6 and the Disaster Relief Team are ongoing.

Basic medical assistance is coming from the Medical Disaster Relief Team. This team is reaching out to the hardest hit villages in north and east Lombok.

The help coming from Bali is deeply appreciated and very much needed...keep those supplies coming! It's what's feeding and clothing so many people on Lombok.

LAOS

Water filters and cash donations are at the Laos Embassy waiting for pick up by a local Laos Rotary Club. Patrick L P's efforts to help flood ravaged Laotians is about to come to fruition.

GUEST SPEAKERS



Douglas Bennett Jr. described Indonesian Aid's past efforts in providing 10,000 liter water tanks in the north of Bali. Doug hopes to do the same on Lombok. The foundation does not see itself as a first responder but rather providing help for the long term. In process is fundraising to work with several villages on Lombok after both government and NGO support ends and true recovery begins. In the short term Indonesian Aid is making small loans to local businesses to help them get back on their feet. Using a warehouse in Mataram, they are distributing food, water,

blankets and building tools and are specifically asking for children's toys. Douglas, stay in touch and let us know more as your work progresses.



Our good friend Jeroen of Nazava Water Filter fame, reminded us that one in seven people worldwide do not have access to safe drinking water and that diarrhea is the second largest cause of infant mortality.

On Aug 6 RCBS learned that nine water filters were desperately needed at medical posts on Lombok. Within minutes, visiting Rotarian Shayne Nash, RC Malvern, Australia, responded by offering to donate the water filters. Again, within minutes, Shayne and Jeroen were in contact

with each other and preparing the filters for shipment to Lombok. This wouldn't be possible without Shayne's Rotarian heart and Jeroen, the man of fast action.

What has Jeroen already accomplished for Lombok and what is the plan?

- A water filter warehouse facility was set up in Mataram Lombok on August 17, 2018.
- We have already supplied 1500 water filter units to Lombok, another 1250 are on their way, many more are needed.
- We provide a mandatory training on the filters and a water filter tracking sheet.
- Life saving and sustainable product. Unlike bottled water. We are here for the long run. Minimum one year before the 500,000 evacuees can return home.
- Social Impacts' goal: 80% of Lombok evacuation camps will have water filters by end September 2018.
