






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Embracing Membership and New Club Development,

Message from Faridah Manutebi President RC Kampala South

Dear Rotary Family and Friends,

As we close the second month of my presidency, I'm inspired by what we've achieved together and grateful for the energy and teamwork that define Kampala South Rotary Club. Our collective efforts are already making a tangible difference in our community and beyond.

Highlights and Achievements in the month of August

We welcomed a new club and strengthened our mentorship network to nurture leadership within the new club, The Rotary of First Aid and Emergency, the world's first-ever Rotary club dedicated to First Aid and Emergency Care.

In a show of solidarity and with a spirit of Service Above Self, a team of rotarians and rotaractors from the rotary clubs of Kampala South, Kabale, Nairobi Samawati & Millimani from Kenya District 9212. Rotaract clubs of Kampala South, Upper Kololo, Kibuli, Kanos & Karura D9212, came together to execute several service projects in Kabale District, Western Uganda on the weekend of 23rd to 24th August 2025.

Among the projects executed were: The handover of a newly constructed classroom block at Nyakijjumba

Primary School; tree planting in partnership with ASA Microfinance; a visit to Grace Villa Orphanage where they donated food; donation of 50 pairs of ducks to the Nyaconga Rotary Community Corps (RCC); and conducted a medical camp at Kamuganguzi Health Centre III where the rotarians educated teenage girls on menstrual hygiene and donated medical supplies, Mama Kits ,sanitary towels and scholastic materials to the girls; they also gave reproductive health education to women.

I express my gratitude to all rotarians and partners of rotary who had supported the Nyakijjumba Primary School project from as far back as 2018. She said Phase I of the project was to renovate the primary 1 to 3 classrooms while phase II was furnishing of the classrooms; while phase III was construction of a new classroom block to accommodate primary 4 to 7.

I implore the community to ensure that their children attend school in order to reduce child marriages and so that they are economically empowered.

The project was initiated by Rct Kampala South in partnership with the rotary clubs of: Chicago Citywide Service, Arlington Heights, Schaumanburg-Hoffman Estates, Glenview Sunrise, Niles and Kampala South.



Corporate partners included: Sanlam Insurance Ltd, Athena Hotel, Nyakijjumba Community, Mathew Lee and Rotaract Uganda Trip.

The handover ceremony was presided over by AG Francis Katigutta of the RC of Kabale.

Over the years RC of Kampala South has ensured that engagement of club members has facilitates the integration of innovative ideas into service projects. Members have been empowered to propose new initiatives, often based on their observations and interactions within their communities. This democratic approach to project development not only strengthens commitment to the projects but also ensures that they are well aligned with the actual needs of those being served.

Maternal and Child Health through Medical Outreach

At Kamuganguzi Health Centre III, a medical camp was conducted, offering outpatient consultations, antenatal care, family planning services, cervical cancer screening, and distribution of essential health kits. A total of 119 patients were attended to, including 28 pregnant women who received antenatal services and mama kits for safe delivery. Additionally, 70 adolescent girls and 26 women were given sanitary pads to support menstrual hygiene. This activity built upon the Rotary Global Grant interventions that have already strengthened maternal and neonatal services at the health centre, ensuring improved healthcare access for a catchment population of over 11,000 people.

Economic Empowerment through Duck Rearing

In Nyaconga Parish, 50 women from the Rotary Community Corps (RCC) were each supported with a pair of ducks (one male and one female) to establish sustainable poultry enterprises. Ducks reproduce quickly, with a female laying between 80 to 120 eggs annually. With proper care, each woman's flock is expected to grow to 15–25 birds within two years, translating into household incomes of UGX 225,000 to UGX 375,000. Beyond income, the project provides a reliable source of nutrition and financial resilience, with the initial 100 ducks projected to create a revolving community flock worth UGX 15 million within two years

PARTNERS COMMIT SH372M TO RESTORE FOREST RESERVE

Conservation partners from the private sector have committed shyzem towards planting 80,000 indigenous tree seedlings in Namananga Central Forest Reserve in Kayunga district over the next year.

Central Forest Reserve in Kayunga district over the next year. The initiative is part of wider efforts to restore degraded sections of the 459ha forest, which forms part of the greater Mabira coxystem.

The partners in this restoration drive include the National Forestry Authority (NFA). Uganda Revertes Limited (UBL) and Rotary Uganda.

Namananga is a critical catchment for the Nalwe and Wugula streams and serves as an ecological corridor linking Mabitra Forest Uganda's largest natural forest cover—to Musamya swamp.

Speaking durfting the signing of the partnership at UBL headquarters in Luzira Kampala, the company's managing director, Andrew Kilonzo, reaffirmed UBL's long-term commitment to forest restoration and environmental conservation. During the function, UBL handed over a dummy cheque of shayam to NFA and Rotary Uganda, who

Data from NFA Indicates that Uganda's forest cover shrunk from 24% in 1990 to just 9% by 2015. Though recent restoration efforts have lifted the figure to 15,44% by 2023, the country still loses an estimated 90,000hi of forest cover yearly due encroachment, firewood and charcoal and unsustainable farming practices.

ROTARY STARTS SHIB DRIVE FOR HEART PATIENTS

Hundreds of heart patients in northern Uganda and West Nile are set to benefit from free surgeries under the Rotary Club's Little Hearts Project, a five-year initiative to cover seven districts.

The project, estimated to cost more than shib (about \$295,000), will be rolled out in Arua, Gulu, Lira, Yumbe, Koboko, Abim and Adjumani districts. It aims to enhance regional hospitals' capacity to diagnose, treat and manage paediatric heart diseases, including congenital and rheumatic conditions.

Speaking during the project launch on Monday at Hotel Africana in Kampala, James Serugo from the Rotary Club of Kampala and district co-ordinator for the Little Hearts Project, said efforts are underway to set up heart treatment centres in selected regional hospitals.

"We are working in six hospitals - Soroti, Mbarara, Lira, Arua, Gulu and Yumbe. We are applying for grants to equip these facilities to provide heart care, while also training cardiac specialists to manage the centres," Serugo said.

He appealed to Rotary clubs, individual Rotarians, media houses and the public to support the initiative, particularly sponsorships and awareness campaigns.

Rotary District D9213 governor Geoffrey Kitakule said the project intends to upgrade infrastructure, procure essential diagnostic and surgical equipment for four hospitals, train

three cardiologists and four cardiology nurses, as well as increase community awareness to promote early detection and treatment.

The launch was attended by several Rotary and Rotaract clubs, including Kampala South, Kiwatule, Arua, Arua Eco City, Gulu, Lira, Lira Metro, Gulu City, Yumbe, Koboko, as well as Arua Nursing School. Organisers said more than 528 workers will be deployed to support the project across different sites.

Rotary Club of Kampala South president Faridah Namutebi said the partnership with local clubs ensures sustainability.


SURGICAL CAMP

The Association of Surgeons of Uganda also announced it will hold a surgical camp in the West Nile region this month. Prof. Moses Galukande, the association's president, said a team of 580 medical workers will depart from Kampala today for a five-day outreach across all 12 districts.

"We shall work in 23 sites, visit 10 schools, and anticipate seeing over 10,000 patients, 8,000 schoolchildren, and operating on about 2,500 patients. These are vulnerable populations," Galukande said.

Kampala South Toastmasters Club has 22 members, and continues to attract members from diverse professions seeking to improve their communication skills, and become better leaders.

In 2023, our second year of existence, the charter President, TM Paul Muwanga, went on to become an Area Director, and Division Director in 2024.

The Club President in 2023 was TM Patrick Lassu, followed by TM Richard Kalungi in 2024.

Together with the past Presidents, they have been instrumental in guiding the club to where it is now.

Kampala South Toastmasters Club has participated in speech contests at Club, Area, Division and District level.

In 2024, the Club performed very well. TM Zambarau Kisakye participated in the International Speech contest, reaching the Area level. TM Martha Bagaaya participated in the On-line Speech contest, and was winner at the Area level, winner at the Division level, qualifying for TEACON in Ethiopia, where the finals at District level were held. She came out fourth overall. This contest attracted participants from Uganda, Rwanda, Kenya and Ethiopia.

The Toastmasters program is self-paced and has 10 Pathways. These Pathways were developed around 5 core competences, namely; Public speaking, Interpersonal communication, Strategic leadership, management and Confidence. The pathways include; Presentation Mastery, Dynamic Leadership, Leadership Development, Effective Coaching, Engaging Humour, Innovative Planning, Motivational Strategies, Persuasive Influence, Team Collaboration, Visionary Communication. Each pathway has different levels and projects.

One of the other attractions of Toastmasters is that it is a safe and positive environment, where everyone seeks to better themselves through useful feedback and evaluations.

A typical meeting has different roles and role takers, which roles help build different skill sets. The roles comprise a Toast master of the day (TMOD), a Timer, a Table Topics master, an Ah counter, a Grammarian, and Evaluators.

Toastmaster of the day (TMOD)

The TMOD is an equivalent of a Master of Ceremonies. They originate the meeting theme and guide the proceedings of the meeting, ensuring smooth transitions.

Skills developed: Time management, organization and public speaking.

Table Topics Master

Leads the session for impromptu speeches. These are spontaneous and short speeches.

Skills developed: Thinking on your feet, and confidence.

Speakers

Delivers prepared speeches on various topics. Skills developed: Structured speech delivery, confidence, body language and storytelling.

Timer

Ensures all speakers adhere to their time limits. Skills developed: Time management, observation and attention to detail.

Grammarian & Ah-Counter

Monitors good language use, including filler words. Skills developed: Active listening, improving grammer and attention to detail.

Evaluator

Provides positive feedback on prepared speeches. Skills developed: Active listening, objective evaluation, and communication skills.

General Evaluator

Evaluates the entire meeting, including quality of speeches and roles. Skills developed: observational skills, critical thinking, and a general understanding of meeting dynamics.

Kampala South Toastmasters Club continues to encourage collaboration with other clubs through joint meetings, Open House engagements, and taking on meeting roles with our sister clubs; MU-JHU Toastmasters Club from Mulago, Ntinda Toastmasters Club, UNOC Toastmasters Club, Lubowa Toastmasters Club, Muyenga Toastmasters Club, etc.

We have had joint meetings with Kampala Executives Toastmasters club.

As Kampala South Toastmasters Club, we are happy to note that all the Presidents of Rotary Club of Kampala South, from the time the Toastmasters Club was established, have been Toastmasters; Odaga Charles, Paul Muhame, Rita Tinka, Samuel Sewagudde and Faridah Namutebi.

Kampala South Toastmasters Club continues to attract members outside of its mother club, and has gone a long way in greatly improving the speech and confidence of its members.





NEW CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Rotary Club of Kampala First Aid and Emergency Response Chartered in a Colourful Celebration!

The Rotary Club of Kampala First Aid and Emergency Response, the world's first-ever Rotary club dedicated to First Aid and Emergency Care, was inaugurated yesterday at Fairway Hotel. District Governor Geoffrey Martin Kitakule of Rotary International District 9213 officially welcomed the club, installing Dr. Mirriam Apiyo as its Charter President and inducting a total of 25 Charter members.

The club's journey began on Cancer Run Day in 2022, when Drs. Richard Kalungi and Peter Kavuma envisioned a world where first aid and emergency care are readily available to all. After a year of planning, the Rotary Club of Kampala South board recognized the efforts and passed a resolution to sponsor the new club in August 2023.

As a cause-based Rotary club, the club attracts both medical and non-medical professionals. Members are united by their passion for first aid and emergency care, and will implement community projects and initiatives around this specific cause. The club has already launched initiatives to create awareness around hypertension by measuring blood pressures and availing blood pressure machines, as well as a first aid kit initiative to provide kits at an affordable price and offer training through Rotary clubs.

Trauma injuries and hypertension are significant public health concerns in Uganda. According to Dr. Hussein Ssenyonjo, a NeuroSurgeon who attended the function, over 25,000 deaths annually are attributed to trauma injuries. In Mulago Hospital, over 85% of patients at the emergency unit, have head injuries usually due to road traffic crushes involving motor cycle "boda boda" riders. Meanwhile, hypertension affects one in three adults globally, with nearly half of those with hypertension unaware of their condition. In Uganda, the burden of hypertension is

substantial, and efforts to prevent, detect, and manage the condition are crucial to preventing related complications such as stroke, heart attack, and kidney damage.

The charter president committed to transforming the first aid and emergency care landscape through the club's efforts. Notably, the club will lead the first aid and emergency care response at the forthcoming District Conference (101st Conference) at Imperial Royale Hotel in April 2026, ensuring delegates are safe and healthy.

Over 150 guests, including Rotarians from nine Rotary clubs, Rotaractors, and friends of Rotary, attended the ceremony. The event was graced by the Charter President's family, workmates from Case Hospital, officials from the Ministry of Health and Rotary District 9213, including the Immediate Past District Governor, District Executive Secretary, District Membership Chair, Assistant Governors, Presidents, and Past Presidents of Rotary Club of Kampala South.

District Governor Geoffrey Kitakule encouraged non-Rotarians to join Rotary and contribute to serving humanity. "The birth of this club is a testament to the power of service and community," he said. "We invite like-minded individuals to join us in making a difference."

The Rotary Club of Kampala First Aid and Emergency Response is poised to make a significant impact in the community, and its inauguration marks a new chapter in Rotary's commitment to service above self.



Cause-Based Clubs: The New Norm in Rotary

Cause-based clubs are increasingly becoming the new norm in rotary circles because of their exclusively corporate membership.

In Uganda, they include the newly chartered ones such as: RC of Kampala First Aid and Emergency Response, set up to train and provide skills to the Rotary fraternity in First Aid and Emergency Care; as well as provide health kits for such emergencies at a reasonable price. RC Mapeera constituted by staff of Centenary Bank; and Provisional RC of Environment and Climate Change. THE ROTARY FOUNDATION (TRF) - "LIFTING ONE ANOTHER TO GREATNESS"

he journey is getting real and sweeter. Two months into the Rotary Year 25/26 and the tyres are already kissing the tarmac. We are grateful to the great Rotarians that have continued to oil The Rotary Foundation wheel into renewed rolling; thank you South. But first, let us understand this TRF subject a little more.

As Rotary's one and only charity, The Rotary Foundation (TRF) taps into a global network of Rotarians who invest their time, money and expertise into priorities that align with our seven areas of focus and Foundation grants empower Rotarians to approach problems such as disease, poverty, illiteracy, and malnutrition with sustainable solutions that leave a lasting impact.

The Rotary Foundation is known throughout the world for its exceptional financial management and for the efficient use of its donations. Every year since 2008, TRF has received the top four-star rating from Charity Navigator, the world's largest and most trusted charity evaluator. This rating is a standard achieved by only one

percent of charities for judicious care of donors' money.

WHAT IS THE ROTARY FOUNDATION?

The Foundation was created in 1917 by Rotary International's sixth president, Arch Klumph. It was established as an endowment fund to provide an ongoing and sustainable income for Rotary to allow us to 'do good in the world'. It has grown from an initial contribution of US\$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City to more than US\$1 billion. It provides grants of over \$1 million per day to support projects led by Rotarians. Today, TRF has one of the largest and most prestigious international fellowship programmes in the world.

Since it was founded, it has spent more than US\$4 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects. TRF's mission is to enable Rotarians 'to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty'.

Our Foundation has special qualities because it is an enabling Foundation. It is a not-for-profit organisation that is supported solely by donations from its members and friends. TRF asks us to donate, just like other charities, but it also asks us to get involved and utilise the funds. Our Foundation is able to achieve its mission through the generous contributions and the active participation of its members.

A major recipient of donations to TRF is the Annual Fund. When we donate, half our contributions are directed to the District Fund and the other half to the World Fund. Both help support and enable Rotary projects to become a reality through global and district grants.

LEADERSHIP

The Board of Trustees manages the business of the Foundation, led by the Trustee Chair, who is currently (2022-2023) Past RI President, Ian Riseley, from Australia. The Rotary International President Elect nominates the Trustees, who are elected by the Rotary International Board of Directors. The Trustee Chair serves for one year and the Trustees serve for four years.

FOUNDATION ACHIEVEMENTS

The Foundation leads the way on worldwide Rotary campaigns such as eradicating polio and promoting peace.



In 1930, the Foundation made its first grant of US \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. In 1947, following the death of Rotary's founder Paul Harris, scholarships were the first large programme to be set up. These scholarships were established pre-dominately as a tribute to Paul. To date, more than 350,000 scholarships have been awarded, allowing re-cipients to study overseas.

Polio eradication is Rotary's top philanthropic priority. Rotary launched the Polio Plus programme in 1985. In 1988, when Rotary began working with its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, there were more than 350,000 polio cases in over 125 countries. Since then, nearly 3 billion children have been immunised against polio, and the incidence of polio has decreased by 99.9 percent. As of 2021, Rotary's contributions to the global polio eradication effort, including matching funds from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, exceeded US\$2 billion.

THE ROAD AHEAD - TRF NIGINA

Hundreds of thousands of people now enjoy access to clean water, health care and education, thanks to TRF's humanitarian projects.

In our inaugural communication at the start of this Rotary Year, we put out to you a number of ways through which we would engage the Members of Kampala South as we walk the giving to humanity path. We all acknowledge that service to the communities around us can only be possible if we spare a portion of our resources towards the cause.

I will expound, for our appreciation, one of the proposed methods to help us contribute to TRF without much damage to our pockets; the TRF *Nigina*. This

is an acclaimed collective way of groupings of people who come together to make periodic support contributions in smaller quantities but the totality of which supports one of the group members to attain a milestone.

In the case of Kampala South, our milestone shall be to achieve a Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) Status for as many members as are in the *Nigina* groups. Yes, the Rotary Club Kampala South can easily become an all PHF Club! For our memory, a PHF is a member who has contributed a minimum of \$1000 in one go or cumulatively. Any further additions of \$1000 above the initial bestows the giver a Multiple PHF Status, a prestigious status in Rotary if you ask me.

In our simple achievable algebra, we have put across different schedules that respective members can chose to belong basing on their abilities and will. These are:
