The installation was attendes by among others several past district governors (PDGs), namely: Mwanje, Tusu, Bob Nsibirwa, Mike Sebalu, John Ndamira and Kakembo Nusbuga. Also, in attendance were several Rotarians representing 74 rotary clubs and rotaractors representing 26 rotaract clubs; as well as members of her family, corporates, friends of rotary and guests; a mini-district conference of sorts as described by many Rotarians present.

Maternal Mental Health Crisis and What you can do about it

Maternal Mental Health Illness (Post Partum Mental Illness)

DEFINITIONS

- Mental Health: A state of mental wellbeing that enables people to cope with:
- · Stresses of life
- Realize their abilities
- Learn well
- Work well
- Contribute to their communities

Post partum mood disorders

- These are changes that occur after delivery
- The post partum period is the time after delivery of the baby up to 6 week.

Post partum blues:- mild condition

- · Feeling sadness
- Anxiety
- Mood swing

Post Partum depression

• **More severe condition:-** feeling sadness, hopelessness and anxiety

Mood disorders

- Post partum anxiety
- · Excessive worry, fear and anxiety

Post partum Psychosis

- Rare but severe condition
- Include symptoms such as hallucination, delusions and disorganized thinking

Symptoms

- Mood swings: feeling sad, anxious or irritable
- Loss of interest: Loosing interest in activities that were once enjoyable
- Change in appetite or sleep patterns
- Fatigue: feeling tired or exhausted
- Difficult in bonding with the baby





Risk factors

History of mental health issues:

- Women with a history of mental health issues, such as depression or anxiety are at higher risk
- Lack of social support

Pregnancy and childbirth complication

- Women who experience complications during pregnancy and child birth
- Some of these experiences are near death events

Treatment and Support Therapy

- Counselling or therapy can make women manage symptoms and develop coping strategies
- Medication
- · Anti depressant or anti-anxiety medication
- Support groups
- Family
- Other social support groups. Support groups can provide women with a sense of community and connecting with others who are experiencing similar challenges

Treatment and support

- Self-care:
- Prioritizing self-care, including rest, nutrition, and exercise, can help women manage symptoms and promote well-being

Strategies for support Increasing access to health care:

- Improving access to health care services, including mental health services, can help rural women receive timely diagnosis and treatment
- Community –based support programs can provide women with access to support groups, counselling and other resources

Cultural sensitivity:

Healthcare providers should be culturally sensitive and aware of the unique needs and experience of rural women

Role of Rotary clubs Awareness and Education:

Hosting workshops or seminars to educate new mothers, families, and communities, about Post Partum Mental illness, its symptoms and its impact.

Providing resources:

Distributing information materials, such as brochures or posters, to raise awareness.

Support groups:

Creating support groups for new mothers to share their experiences, receive emotional support, and connect with others who have gone through similar challenges

Strategies for support

Education and awareness:

- Educating women and communities about puerperal psychosis and mental health issues can help reduce stigma and early intervention
- Understanding the unique challenges of women, health care providers can develop targeted strategies to support their mental health and wellbeing during the post partum period

Strategies for support

Partnering with healthcare providers:

Collaborating with healthcare providers to refer mothers to support groups or provide additional resources

Community Engagement

Community outreach: engage with local communities to promote awareness and reduce stigma around mental health issues.

Fundraising:

Organize fundraising events or campaigns to support Post partum mental illnesses research, treatment or support services

Service Projects

Home visitation programs:

Develop home visitation programs to provide new mothers with emotional support, practical assistance and connection to local resources.

Mother baby programs:

Programs that provide support, education and resource for new mothers and their babies

Collaboration

Partnering with local organizations:

Health care providers, Non profits or community groups, to amplify efforts and leverage resources

Advocacy:

Advocating for policies and programs that support new mothers and families, such as paid family leave, or mental health services.
