GET INVOLVED

We currently need volunteer and work study tutors at seventeen sites throughout Greater Madison.

Tutors meet one-on-one or with small groups of students at least an hour each week.

Tutoring happens at the school, Monday through Friday, either during the student's learning lab, classroom periods, or after school.

HOW DO I BECOME A TUTOR?

You do not need to have prior training or tutoring experience, but comfort in math and literacy skills are preferred. Schools of Hope will provide you a variety of orientation and training opportunities to support you as a tutor.

You start by completing an application and a disclosure form. Based on your time, availability, and where you are interested in volunteering, you will be matched with a school and a student.

WHAT DO WE DO?

Schools of Hope was created to reduce the gap in academic achievement between African-American, Latino, and Southeast Asian students and their white peers in Greater Madison.

The Urban League works closely with twelve middle schools to recruit, train, and match tutors with students. These efforts will ensure that ALL students are adequately prepared to complete algebra and other academic subjects when they enter high school, leading to successful graduation, and a possibility of attending a 2- or 4-year institute of higher education.

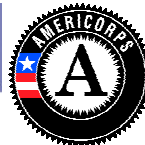
