Community

This year I continued to support the Surfers Paradise Anglican Crisis as my local charity of choice. The Centre which has been operating since

October 1981, is located at St John's on Hamilton Street, in Surfers Paradise. They help the disadvantaged and homeless in our community in ways that preserve their dignity and self-respect, and provide a number of support services:

Drop In Centre for people in crisis where for a donation of \$2 they provide a hot meal, tea or coffee, plus a pack of sandwiches, fruit and biscuits to take away for an evening meal. This is partially funded by government.

Welfare Office provides assistance to people in emergency/crisis situation (families/sole parents and singles).

Ken and Joan Hancock Homes provides accommodation for homeless men wishing to



re-establish their lives and have a more positive and productive lifestyle. This is medium to long-term accommodation. (Targets over 20 year olds who do not have a disability or addiction).

Blessing Cupboard Gifts provides small gifts to the many distressed and crying clients (men and women) seeking emergency relief.

As in the past the club during the year made a cash donation of \$2,500 (see photo, left) as well as support in



kind by providing toiletries, clothes, and house-hold resources provided by the generosity of our members. We also supported a number of other projects

including:

The Gold Coast Suns Horizon Project benefitted from a donation from the Ball. This project supports a number of Gold Coast Charities. Several members have assisted other deserving causes including knitting vests for babies for a local charity to be distributed in the Pacific Islands, donating sheets and towels to make 'birthing' packs for overseas.

Griffith University Ernie Hicks Memorial Scholarship Lyn Macarthur reports. The scholarship was established to honour Ernie Hicks for his generosity and hard work in establishing the Rotary Village. The scholarship rewards students with academic ability that have overcome significant personal adversity and have achieved entrance to Griffith University. We provide encouragement and financial assistance towards the successful completion of their undergraduate education. The scholarship is valued at \$9,000 paid in semester instalments over three years and the students are asked to attend a Rotary meeting after each semester to update the members on their progress.

This year's scholarship recipient is Leah Henderson, below, who is studying Psychology



at Griffith University. Leah attended a Rotary meeting in May, along with her very proud and supportive grandparents, and spoke to the members about her course and her career aspirations. It will be wonderful to hear of her progress at

University when she speaks at our Rotary Club at the beginning of her Semester 2 in August this year.

The 2013 Scholarship recipient Brie Foran continues to enjoy her courses. Brie attended a Rotary meeting in April when she spoke of her studies and how she plans to study in the USA and beyond. Brie is completing a double science degree and I'm sure most of the members were in awe of her aspirations! It was even suggested that we might have a future Nobel Prize winner in our midst! Ken Baguley Bursary The Ken Baguley Bursary was established to honour the founding President of the Club, Ken Baguley, whose vision was to prepare young people for a complex world by providing maximum education opportunities and assistance to all students, but particularly to those in more difficult circumstances. It is open to students studying at Griffith University's Gold Coast campus in disciplines associated with business administration, management, accounting or hospitality. The Ken Baguley Bursary is valued at \$3,000 made in a one off payment and is awarded to a student who is enrolled in the 2nd year of their academic program. The student must also have a GPA of 5.0 or above.

This year's awardee is Vanessa Tan who is studying a Bachelor of Business/ Bachelor of Communication at Griffith University. Vanessa attended, along with her brother who has been extremely supportive of her, a Rotary meeting in April this year. Vanessa spoke with maturity beyond her years and the members certainly enjoyed their chats with Vanessa and her brother. It has been an enormous honour to have met and spent time with not only the above students but also all those students we interview. They are such an inspiration and as a Rotary club we should be extremely proud to have played even a small part in encouraging these young people and helping them along their academic and personal life journeys.

Rotary Village In 1988 that then Rotary Club of Bundall, later Gold Coast Central before the merger, negotiated a 50 year lease for a plot of land in Lab-

rador along with a \$347,000 grant to build a Rotary Village of eight units with the view that these would provide affordable accommodation for the elderly. We also raised an extra \$56,000 to



build an additional two units,10 in total, and we accepted it as a loan from the late Ernie Hicks, a member of the club who later forgave the balance of the loan. (The Griffith University Scholarship was named in his honour.)

After many years in the planning the final two units were built and completed in 2013.

To be eligible to reside in the village we source the applicants from the Department of Housing. The applicants must be in receipt of a full age pension, be a resident of the Gold Coast and they must be capable of looking after themselves.

We have completed many general maintenance jobs around the village this year such as repairs to a ceiling that had dropped, repairs to air conditioners, batteries replaced in all smoke alarms and two out of date smoke alarms replaced, power point not working, a fan switch that burnt out and wouldn't turn off, a length of guttering fell down in one of the storms, three cracked shower screens and so on.

Most interesting was the snake that slithered into the air-conditioner in unit two! I had the snake

catcher over there within 20 minutes, and due them getting there so quickly they were able to remove the snake successfully before it got right into the works of the air conditioner.

Then there was the live main power lines fallen over unit 1, the driveway and up over unit 12's roof! Energex to the rescue for that one.

Then there was the huge wasp's nest in the car port that the pest people handled.

Due to the age of the units all of the awnings needed to be replaced, as well as the lattice fence that was falling down around the bin area at the front
