Grass roots charity in action. Thank you Brian; truly inspirational.



Sad farewell to former ROMAC Patron Max Walker

ROMAC Members and Rotary Clubs all feel sadness at the passing of Max Walker in September 2016. Max died at the age of 68 after losing his battle with cancer.

He had made huge efforts as an international bowler for Australia, a high profile author, public speaker and media personality.

His contribution to Rotary was outstanding and he and his wife Kerry made a huge effort for Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children patients, par-

ticularly in giving presentations on ROMAC's achievements.

Max was truly dedicated to ROMAC and was its National Patron. He was reported as saying "We bring kids in from overseas that wouldn't normally get the medical services that we take for granted in Australia. They come in with terrific burns, cleft palates, club feet and you meet those kids and it makes you appreciate your own kids and friends. When they leave, their body and mind has been changed forever."

Max was honoured in the Queen's Birthday Honours list in 2011 being made a Member of the Order of Australia.

So many ROMAC patients have suffered their illnesses and conditions for many years before they are found. Our surgeons in Australia and New Zealand benefit from the experience of complex and rare cases that are not generally seen in our regions.

The efforts of Max Walker were outstanding and won't be forgotten. - Jill Ellis

Our Past President Justin Schaffer set up a Trust when he emigrated to Oz) so as to educate youngsters here through university who would otherwise not have the opportunities that his forebears had escaping the pogroms in northern Europe over the past century or so, finding sanctuary here in the Eastern Cape. Justin became a very successful businessman, yet most influential politically in working towards a solution towards our New Republic (and it was great

fluential politically in working towards a solution towards our New Republic [and it was great, hailed and admired by all] -he had a 'geluk' in a particular investment which produced stellar results which he attributed to his education and that of his parentage in this country.

Justin and his beloved (alas, late) Elsa moved to Oz to be with their children and theirs in that country but wished to leave a legacy to the country which had meant so much to his family and had introduced him to Elsa – their progeny were also educated here. So a Trust was established for youngsters who showed promise but not the resources to pass onto tertiary education to get that start in Life. I am proud to say that the Justin-Elsa Trust has caused 26 youngsters to graduate out of UCT in the relatively short span of the existence of the Trust – and they have succeeded already in making a positive difference to our society.

What a wonderful story – what a legacy!

I am privileged to act as a trustee and am called on every time we meet with the students and the alumni to remind them of the spirit of that gesture and generosity that had and has enabled them to move on: I do so in an endeavour to inspire them (when and if their ships come in) to replicate that spirit and 'pass on the joy' to others, if not financially, than at least, in encouragement, counsel or influence. One of the aims of the trust which I emphasise is that the students and alumni should bond into a fellowship which might together perpetuate the Founders' sentiments into a ripple, if not Tsunami — and an upward spiral of beneficiation of our nation.

[I also mention that we met through Rotary and underline the great work it does throughout the world. Hopefully they may become Rotarians albeit via an E-Club and be drawn into the great work that we do].

I am mostly emotionally drained after my address to the students and alumni but rewarded beyond measure by the hugs I receive from the students – which I pass on to the Schaffer Family who really deserve that Love.

Bravo, Bravissimo to the Founders!

May the Legend live on...and the 'Force' be with them and the beneficiaries as we and they all move along."

International Director's report

Orphanage and Special School at Suang Luang in Laos

Some few years ago John and Marilyn Bee gave a presentation to Rotary Club of Gold Coast explaining the work that they, and other Rotarians, were carrying out in this Orphanage.

The Orphanage houses and educates 650 children who either have no parents, or whose parents are so poor they cannot feed, clothe or educate their children. At the time of the original presentation the orphanage had no constant supply of clean running water, no useable sanitation facilities, the only food available was 2 meals per day of sticky rice with a little pork fat – which they had to prepare for themselves.

John and Marilyn and other Rotarians formed "Global Support Association" to commit to improving the living conditions and health of these unfortunate children. Much work has been done since then and the situation has improved as a result – much still needs to be done. The purpose of my presentation to the Club on 3rd November is to report on the enormous progress

that has been made and hopefully to gain some financial support for this project in my year as International Director.

Early in 2015 I formed a new registered, Not for Profit Charity, "In 2 Bat" for those in need, with several of the Directors also being Directors of "Global Support Association". In 2 Bat was designed to give individuals, who were not willing to join service clubs such as Rotary or Lions, or others, but were willing to help less fortunate people in need of help. "In 2 Bat" has now become the leading fund raiser for "Global Support Association" as well as other projects on the Gold Coast. My talk will also explain this situation and give members an opportunity to ask questions. - Brian Pearson.

Community Director's report

In my previous two reports I proposed the following in support of the Anglican Crisis Care:

- 1. Level 1 members donate items that help on a day-to-day basis. These can be toiletries, cleaning items, etc that can be bought at the supermarket when members are doing their weekly shopping. I will have a list of items for the next meeting. This can be ongoing.
- 2. Level 2 be ready to assist prior to next winter, with the donation of warm clothing and blankets for those who unfortunately have to sleep on the streets.
- 3. Level 3 make a financial donation as we have in the past which assists the Anglican Crisis Care at St John's to continue to provide assistance at varying levels to the homeless.

David – please can we help with a financial donation as we have done previously (\$5,000)?

4. Level 4 – look at committing to a long-term approach in assisting them with their goal of building/acquiring accommodation that can be used to accommodate the homeless.

I also made the following comment: 'I would like to propose that rather than trying to support everyone who approaches us and spreading ourselves too thin

that we concentrate on the one service and try to make a difference. I accept that there will always be ad hoc needs but sometimes I feel that clubs donate on an emotional basis which can in turn detract from ongoing project sustainability.'

Days for Girls – the 'knickers' kindly donated by members of our club have been passed on to Kaileen of the Mt Warning Club. She was very appreciative of our generosity. This is an ongoing project and we can continue to support them. They are applying for a Rotary grant for this project. They are also looking at supporting the 'Orange Sky' project, ie the Van with washer and dryer, and now shower facilities for the homeless. Another very worthy cause.




