Sunday Morning-Memorial Service, Jazz Brunch and Rotarian Game Contest then return home with great memories!





Inner Wheel Club of Slidell's Annual Foundation Walk

Before I begin to talk about our Club's Annual Foundation Walk, I must speak about the loss of a very special lady who passed away on March 2, 2018. Elaine Weil Duvic lived in the New Orleans region her entire 93 years, and was a physics teacher and principal. She was married to Rotarian Frank Duvic, Jr. who passed away in 2006. She used that intelligence and discipline to gather like minded Rotary wives to start the Inner Wheel Club of Slidell in 1988. That same year, she became a founding member of the Inner Wheel Foundation. Elaine helped to set up the Myloelectric Limb Project as the Foundation's mission. Her huge impact on Inner Wheel and the Foundation is still evident, as she specified this charity for donations at her funeral in lieu of flowers.

2007 the Slidell Club first organized the Foundation Walk so members could solicit sponsors for the one mile walk. The goal of each member was \$100 raised for the Foundation. That first year we raised \$1,100. In recent years we set the date of the walk in February and have invited the local high school Interact

several parks to choose from in Slidell and this year held our Foundation Walk at John Slidell Park. We had 16 participants including Rotarians Jay Rose, Bill Newton, Lydia Alford, Sharron Newton and Vicky Magas. We raised over \$3,600 and will supplement the remaining funds from our cash on hand to total \$4,000 for the Foundation. The four members who were selected as Rose Council Pin recipients, (similar to Paul Harris Awards), all chose to defer individual recognition to recognize our club. Those members are Jane Alford, Pam Anderson, Kathy Berault, and Nancy O'Bryan.

We are very lucky to have two talented fundraising members in our Club. Sharron Newton (2016-2017 President) and Vicky Magas both reached out to the Slidell Rotary Club and the Slidell Rotary Club Northshore for donations. Both Sharron and Vicky are Rotary and Inner Wheel club members. As the District 6840 Assistant District Governor, Vicky heard about a matching grant possibility through Rotary. She approached the two Slidell Rotary clubs about applying for the grant money and they each agreed to pledge \$500 next year. While the grant application process takes almost a year, the Slidell Northshore and the Westbank (of New Orleans) Rotary clubs each gave \$500 toward our Foundation Walk this year! In Vicky and Sharron's pleas to the Rotary clubs and the very supportive District Governor, Kathie Short, they stressed that Inner Wheel Club of Slidell contributes in a very real sense to the successes of the Slidell Rotary clubs. And the Foundation's Myoelectric Limbs Project to Give a Child a Hand, is certainly worthwhile. While this year's Foundation Walk fundraising was very successful, we look forward to an even better year in 2018-2019!

Matching Points Spring Campaign!

March 10-May 30, 2018

District 6840 Fall Matching Points campaign was a huge success with over \$45,000 in donations to The Rotary Foundation and over 200 new or additional Paul Harris Fellowships awarded.

Through the generosity of two Past District Governor from District 6840, **PDG Subbash Kulkarni (2001-2002)** and PDG **Jerry Fortino (2006-2007)** we are now announcing a Spring Campaign with matching points for every donation of \$100.00 or more until the total of 50,000 points is depleted.

Donations can be designated in two ways:

Polio Plus which will be matched to that Rotary International Program by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation \$2.00 additional for each \$1.00 contributed. I have a strong commitment to this program and District 6840 is a leader in the campaign this year!

Children's Advocacy Center, HopeBoy Scouts of America-Cypress District – beneficiary since the inception of the Slidell Heritage Festival

Community Christian Concern – provides basic necessities to 6,000 people in crisis each year

EXCEED in STEM – EXCEED in science, technology, engineering and math supports a local robotics team and funds STEM-related classroom activities


