THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM

Dr. Raymond Thomas (Tommy) King, President of William Carey University, is our speaker.

Dr. King has served the Southern Baptist denomination on the local, state, and national level. In local churches, he has served on the staff, on significant committees, and as a teacher and a deacon. He is a former member of the Mississippi Baptist Convention Board and was a member of the Gulfshore Baptist Assembly Restoration Committee following Hurricane Camille. His denominational service includes eight years as a member of the Southern Baptist convention Executive Committee.

In addition to formerly maintaining a private counseling practice, Dr. King has served in many leadership roles in the field of education. He

maintains membership in numerous professional organizations, also including serving as a diplomat of the American Psychotherapy Association. Among his many honors, Dr. King was named Columbia's Outstanding Citizen in 1989. He is also a Lion's Club International Foundation Melvin Jones Fellow. Fellow recipients are recognized for their outstanding humanitarian work.

A member of the Columbia Lions Club since 1983, Dr. King has held many offices within the association, including club president, zone chairman, region chairman and district governor. He was appointed to the Lions Club international board of directors. In addition, he established the Mississippi Lions Deaf camp and was inducted into the Mississippi Lions Hall of Fame in 2002. recognition of his service to the Lion's Club, Dr. King has received numerous awards including the Ambassador of Goodwill Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He also received the 100% Club President Award, the 100% District Governor Award, an Extension Award, an International Leadership Award, two International President's Certificates of Appreciation, and four International President's Awards.

Named the WCU 1980 Alumnus of the Year, Dr. King has a solid record of active participation in civic affairs. He served on the Laurel Planning Commission; as president and member of the board of directors, Jones County Unit, American Cancer Society; as a board member of Laurel-Jones Count Library; and as president of the Marion County Unit, American Cancer Society.

Dr. King was unanimously chosen by the William Carey University board of trustees as the ninth president of the 100-year old institution. Dr. King, the first graduate of Carey to be named president, comes to the position with more than 30 years of experience in public education from elementary to university levels. At Carey he has served as dean of the school of psychology and counseling, vice president for graduate and off-campus programs, professor of psychology, and executive vice president. Dr. King was acting president since September 2006, following the death of Dr. Larry W. Kennedy.

Dr. King received a Bachelor of Arts degree from William Carey College, Masters' degrees from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and the University of Southern Mississippi, and a Doctorate in Education from the University of Southern Mississippi.

Dr. King is married to Sandra Simmons King of Mt. Herman, Louisiana, and together they have one son, Dave, and two grandsons, Chris and Andrew.
