This week's Mystery Rotarian was the best paper boy/girl in their neighborhood. They went from having 22 customers to over 222 in less than a year. He/She loves to fish and has a private pilot license with over 100 successful beach landings. This land, sea and sky lover is Gene Owens. Jaclyn then introduced Robin Bixler to talk briefly about the Miss Hospitality pageant. The purpose of the Mississippi Miss Hospitality Pageant is to identify and present young and knowledgeable ladies to help promote the state in tourism and economic development. The Mississippi Miss Hospitality Pageant offers more than \$100,000 in scholarships and prizes to young women from across the state.

Robin then introduced Erin Morgan, Miss Hospitality 2015. Erin is a senior at Mississippi State University pursuing a degree in kinesiology with plans to attend physical therapy school. Erin thanked the Hattiesburg area residents for our general hospitality to her and the other 28 girls in the pageant.

Erin shared her speech with us and described Mississippi as "A decedent place that's one part heritage, two parts adventure with a pinch of heart and a dash of soul. A place that's as hot as a Delta Blues dive on a Friday night and that is still smooth and sweet as Tupelo honey".

Jaclyn then introduced Didi Ellis, the Executive Director of Kids Hub. Didi explained The National Children's Advocacy Center was started in 1985, by former Congressman Robert E. "Bud" Cramer (AL), who was then a District Attorney in Madison County, Alabama. He saw the need to create a better system to help abused children.

Before: If the child decided to tell their teacher about any abuse, they would have to tell that same story over and over and relive it each time to their: Teacher, Nurse, Guidance counselor, Principle, Law enforcement—District Attorney, Department of Human Services, (DHS).

This was only adding to the children's emotional distress, and creating a segmented and often frightening experience for the child victims. So the Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) approach was developed. Now the child can disclose the abuse to the teacher or counselor and they then report it to DHS and law enforcement. From there a file is created and the child is scheduled for a forensic

interview, which is recorded. DHS, law enforcement and others are in another room watching the interview without the child's knowledge. The child does not have to repeatedly relive the trauma. Without this local program, abused children in our area would have to travel to the coast, Waveland or Jackson to receive services. Kids Hub is a non-profit organization providing services to children who have been victims of physical and/or sexual abuse as well as children that have witnessed violent crimes. They serve Forrest, Lamar, Jefferson Davis, Marion, Pearl River, Lawrence and Covington counties.

In 2014, Forrest County had 844 reported abuse cases. Of these, 227 were sexual abuse. Lamar County had 533 abuse cases with 111 being sexual abuse.

Following are the services they provide.

- Forensic Interviews: A child's opportunity to share in detail their experiences
- Family & Victim Advocacy: to make sure they receive follow-up care and services
- Child Abuse Prevention Education:
- To educate children in school on child abuse prevention and awareness
- To educate individuals, families and communities on what child abuse is and how it is affecting our communities and ways we can help prevent and stop it
