ROTARY DEFENDS EFFORTS TO END POLIO

Hewko responds to The Economist

John Hewko, Rotary's general secretary and chief executive officer, recently responded to an article in The Economist magazine about the efforts of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) that did not mention Rotary.

The 21 July article, "Late? Or never?", cited the most recent GPEI Independent Monitoring Board report and stated that the goal of stopping polio transmission by 2012 is in jeopardy due to a funding gap and other issues.

Rotary's efforts detailed

In his 6 August letter to the editor, "Keeping polio at bay", Hewko pointed out that Rotary is a "big partner" in the GPEI and has contributed more than US\$1 billion to polio eradication efforts. He noted that India has not had a new case of polio in the past six months. Hewko also stated that Rotary welcomes the Independent Monitoring Board's assessment, and he urged government and private-sector donors to step up to help meet the funding gap.

In a portion of the letter that was edited out by The Economist, Hewko wrote: "Rotary's role -through our network of 1.2 million members in 200 countries and regions -- is to raise awareness and the critically needed funds to end this crippling disease once and for all, and that includes donating countless volunteer hours to reach children worldwide with the oral polio vaccine."

BBC quotes Rotary

BBC News ran an online article about the monitoring board's report, "Goal to rid world of polio by end of 2012 'off track", and approached International PolioPlus Committee Chair Robert S. Scott for comment. "We will work with our members in countries affected by polio to follow the board's recommendation of creating a checklist to enhance the impact of the immunization teams and ensure standardization," Scott said.

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

Janice Touchstone gave members information on the Foundation which was shared during the recent District Seminar. Rotary International has raised just over \$174 million in its fight against Polio. Another \$75 million is needed. We're down to just one remaining case in India. More than 2 million vaccines have been administered since the program began. Club members are encouraged to become sustaining members at \$100 annually. Those funds are returned to Rotary clubs throughout the world for specific projects. Additionally, members are encouraged to sign up for their \$33 annual Polio Plus contribution.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

Greg Buie then introduced today's guest speaker, Dr. Marco Giardino with the NASA John C. Stennis Space

Center. Dr. Giardino is currently researching the history of the families who lived in what is now known as the Buffer Zone or the area that now comprises the Space Center. He is an archeologist and has spent his career compiling the land records and history of the people who inhabited this land as far back as 10,000 BC.

The Buffer Zone consists of 3,200 individual parcels of land. Property owners back in 1961 were given the option if either selling their property, leasing easements or having their land taken by eminent domain. The parcels represent 215 square miles. According to Dr. Giardino the noise from the rocket engines being tested as the Center would have broken windows and damaged property had the owners remained in the area. Homes and other structures were either moved or torn down.

The land where the Space Center stands was formed by the last ice age. It is the highest coastal ground from Texas to Alabama. Because of an abundance of artesian wells, the high ground, the closeness to the Gulf of Mexico and the Pearl River, Native Americans inhabited the area early as far back as 10,000 BC.

Napoleon is one of the cities that was purchased. It is believed that this was the first European Settlement in the area and dated back to the 1700s. Gainesville, another city purchased in the development was the county seat for what is now Hancock and Pearl River Counties. Bayou LaCroix was the last Choctaw Indian village in the area before the tribe was moved to the reservations.

The records that have been discovered and organized by Dr. Giardino will be preserved and will be available for generations to come. He hopes to have a virtual map of 19th century Gainesville available in the very near future. By using satellite and the Geographical Information System, future researchers will be able to reconstruct the history of what is now known as the John C. Stennis Space Center.
