

Scott Hummel provided us with a classification talk. He is a 1987 graduate of William Carey University and a former Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship recipient. He taught school in Texas for ten years and served as the president of a Texas Rotary Club. He is now employed at William Carey University where he says he stays very busy with the new projects and programs being developed at WCU.

Bill Tolbert then presented his classification talk. Bill is a graduate of Delta State University. After graduation from dental school he practiced for fourteen years in Bay St. Louis. He recently relocated his practice to the Hattiesburg area and his 14 year Rotarian membership as well.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

Mike Ratliff introduced today's guest speaker, Ben Morris. Ben is a Rotary Ambassadorial scholarship recipient and was sponsored by the Hattiesburg Rotary Club. He is finishing up his Ph.D. from Cambridge University where he is a student of cultural heritage and environmental impact. Ben spent part of the past four years researching the cultural changes in the City of New Orleans that came as a result of

the devastation to the area caused by Hurricane Katrina.

Ben acknowledges that the human environment is changing. Whether it is being caused by global warming or it's just the earth going through a change is not a part of his study. He merely accepts the fact that our environment is changing and with those changes we will likely be called on to make many adjustments in our

He calls to our attention the 2005 hurricane season where, for the first time, we ran out of letters in the alphabet and had to use Greek letters to name all the storms that year. Eight of the past ten years have been the hottest in recent recorded history. With the polar caps melting at unprecedented rates and thirteen of the world's fifteen largest cities being located on the oceans, real changes are predicted for our future.

The Katrina event gave Ben a ready-made research project for cultural and environmental relationship studies. Disasters take people back to their fundamentals, including their art, their culture and their heritage. According to Ben, our heritage is also representative of our ecology. Our culture provides us with the things we all share in common as well as those things that represent our differences. Ben reports that 88 percent of the New Orleans metro Parish is back to normal. There has been substantial property consolidation in the Central Business District. Some of the art and cultural treasurers of the city are returning, but much work is left in this area.

In December Ben plans to be a part of a group that will be producing a documentary from Copenhagen where the Kyoto Protocols are to be re-drafted. Artists from all over the world are making the journey and plan to demonstrate their works on the periphery of the negotiations. The group hopes to document the changes in the world's art and culture that are being influenced by the environment. The group is seeking financial support for their logistical needs. Benjamin A. Watson Acting Director - Mississippi Transitional Recovery Office

Benjamin Watson joined FEMA in May 2006, serving as the Chief of Staff for the Mississippi Transitional Recovery Office.

Prior to joining FEMA, Mr. Watson served as an officer in the U.S. Coast Guard. He received his commission as an Ensign from the U.S. Coast Guard Officer Candidate School in Yorktown, Virginia in December 1977. He served in a variety of operational and staff positions, culminating in command of Coast Guard Sector Detroit, Michigan from 2002 to 2005. He served in positions with the Office of the Secretary of Defense, the Office of the Vice President and as the Senior Coast Guard Advisor to the Joint Staff in the Pentagon.

Mr. Watson is a native of Murfreesboro, Tennessee. He graduated from the University of North Florida with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Public Administration and attended the U.S. Naval War College where he earned a Master of Arts Degree in National Strategy and Strategic Studies in 1993.
