PROGRAM FOR THE WEEK OF NOVEMBER 28TH

Kris King introduced the speaker, Billy Scruggs. Billy is the Coordinator of Community Service for the Twelfth Judicial Court District and is under the direction of District Attorney, Jon Mark Weathers.

Billy let members know that a felony is a crime that carries a sentence of 11 months and 29 days. He also reported that it takes \$26.00 per day to house a prisoner in the Forrest County jail. He noted that the jail currently has a population of 222. The average cost to house an inmate in a prison setting is \$34.85 per day. At Parchman he reports that the cost is \$39.71 per day.

Persons who are screened and get assigned to this program have to pay fines, court costs, and a monthly supervision fee. So, in addition to keeping them out of the prison system and incurring those expenses, this program actually offers some offset to the expenses of maintaining the program.

For a person to get into the program, they must plead guilty to their crime. The judge then defers acceptance of their plea and places them into this program. During their five years, the candidate must not break any laws, must not ever be in possession of a firearm, must take regular drug tests and must contribute up to 35 hours of community service each week. They have to have approval of who they associate with and where they can go. They cannot leave the state of Mississippi without advance permission.

If a candidate successfully completes the five year program, they are released with no criminal record.

Bill notes that most of their candidates, about 85%, are high school dropouts. A GED element is new to the program. If a high school drop out gets into the program, they are required to attend the GED classes

Local Rotarians partner with Mississippi clubs to assist library

Way The Rotary Club of Florence recently became aware of a public library in Mississippi which was devastated by Hurricane Katrina and which receives no state funding. The Long Beach Public Library is supported by the town of Long Beach, MS. Not surprisingly, the town of Long Beach was also devastated by Hurricane Katrina and is close to running out of money.

Rotarians in the Florence Club "passed the hat" and contributed \$2,050 to assist the Long Beach Public Library. The club's Board of Directors also pledged \$2,500 toward the project.

Club President Charles Saverance then contacted Rotary District 7770 Grants Chairman Rick Moore about some matching Rotary grant money. Moore informed Saverance that Rotary grant money was only available for use in the United States if the club partnered with another club in another district.

Saverance contacted Conrad Welker, President of the Rotary Club of Hattiesburg, MS. Welker enlisted the assistance of the Rotary Club of Hattiesburg Sunrise and the Rotary Club of Petal, MS. Those three clubs raised approximately \$6,000 for the project and agreed to partner with the Florence club.

Since there was now a partnership with clubs in Rotary District 6840, Saverance applied for grant money from District 7770. A matching grant in the amount of \$2,500 was approved by the Grants Committee. With the \$2,050 in contributions from the Rotary Club's membership added to the \$2,500 approved by the Board and the \$2,500 matching grant, the Rotary Club of Florence had a total of \$7,050 for this worthwhile

Saverance drove to Mississippi to personally present a check for \$7,050 to the Friends of the Long Beach Public Library to be used for book bindings, book covers, staples, paper clips, tape, filing systems and other supplies and materials needed in the operation of a library which were not currently within the budget of the town of Long

Beach.

Rotary Club of Hattiesburg President Welker, Rotary Club of Hattiesburg Sunrise President Peggy Carlin, Rotary Club of Petal President Kay Spiers and Rotary Club of Long Beach President Doug St. John also participated in the presentation of the check.

Saverance thanked the other club presidents for their participation, and thanked his own board for their initiative in making the project a reality.

"The world is full of sayers of things," Saverance said, paraphrasing Rotary Founder Paul Harris. "I am glad to have a Board made up of doers of things."

The Rotary Club of Florence meets Mondays at the Florence Civic Center. It is made up of 147 leaders in the community. Rotary's motto is "Service Above Self," and the current year's theme is "Lead The Way."
