History of Rotary-The Beginning

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, was formed on February 23, 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The Rotary name derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.

Rotary's popularity spread, and within a decade, clubs were charted from San Francisco to New York to Winnipeg, Canada. By 1921, Rotary clubs had been formed on six continents. The organization adopted the Rotary International name a year later.

As Rotary grew, its mission expanded beyond serving club members' professional and social interests. Rotarians began pooling their resources and contributing their talents to help serve communities in need. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.

By 1925, Rotary had grown to 200 clubs with more than 20,000 members. The organization's distinguished reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers and a host of other luminaries to its ranks.

Four Way Test

In 1932, Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor created the Four Way Test, a code of ethics adopted by Rotary 11 years later. The test, which has been translated into more than 100 languages, asks the following questions: Of the things we think, say or do:

Is it the truth?

Is it fair to all concerned?

Will it build goodwill ad better friendships?

Will it be beneficial to all concerned?



Rotary and World War II

During WWII, many clubs were forced to disband, while others stepped up their service efforts to provide emergency relief to victims of the war. In 1942, looking ahead to the postwar era, Rotarians called for a conference to promote international educational and cultural exchanges. This event inspired the founding of UNESCO.

In 1945, 49 Rotary club members served in 29 delegations to the UN Charter Conference. Rotary still actively participates in UN Conferences by sending observers to major meetings and covering the UN in its publications.

"Few there are who do not recognize the good work which is done by Rotary clubs throughout the free world," former Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain once declared.

Dawn of a new century

As it approached the 21st century, Rotary worked to meet society's changing needs, expanding its service efforts to address such pressing issues as environmental degradation, illiteracy, world hunger and children at risk. In 1989 the organization voted to admit women into clubs worldwide and now claims more than 145,000 female members in its ranks.

After the collapse of the Berlin Wall and the dissolution of the Soviet Union, Rotary clubs were formed or reestablished throughout Central and Eastern Europe. The first Russian Rotary club was chartered in 1990, and the organization underwent a growth spurt for the next several years.

More than a century after Paul Harris and his colleagues chartered the club that eventually led to Rotary International, Rotarians continue to take pride in their history. In honor of that first club, Rotarians have preserved its original meeting place, Room 711 in Chicago's Unity Building, by recreating the office as it existed in 1905. For several years, the Paul Harris 711 Club maintained the room as a shrine for visiting Rotarians. In 1989, when the building was scheduled to be demolished, the club carefully dismantled the office and savaged the interior, including doors and radiators. In 1993, the RI Board of Directors set aside a permanent home for the restored Room 711 on the 16th floor of RI World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois. Today 1.2 million Rotarians belong to over 32,000 Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas.

Today's speaker was Les Hatcher, Lt. Col. He was an Air Force pilot for 20 years. He was the first pilot to fly 100 combat missions in the B-52. He conducted 208 Combat missions in Vietnam.

Lt. Col. Hatcher is a native of Lucedale and he and his wife Mary of 51 years still reside there. He is a graduate of Ole Miss and William Carey University with degrees in Biology and Psychology. He currently is serving as the Director of Counseling at Temple Baptist Church.

Les was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross award by one of his generals for saving his life during a low-level daylight mission over North Vietnam. It was reported that during this mission they were to drop crates of grenades on the target when their plane lost radar. However, thanks to his expertise and skill, Les continued the course as he projected and completed the mission. He humbly said that he was "just doing his job."

Lt. Col Les Hatcher also told of a testing mission he

was involved in. He had to determine how long it would take and at what altitude that a pilot could survive without air conditioning in a pressurized suit. Again, he was successful in this mission.

Les told stories of determination and spoke with great confidence on the importance of being steadfast and moving forward with wherever you are in your life. He also recognized the impact that your "roots" have on how one can develop in life. He gave the example of his father who was a farmer and was approached by a college basketball coach. The coach wanted him to play but his father would not because he needed to provide for his family. Les Hatcher's father was provided a house, an education, and a way of living to support his family playing college basketball. All of Les' brothers and sisters went on to earn college degrees.
