
DR. MILAM "SONNY-34" COTTEN

"Sonny-34" passed away Thursday morning, but the legacy of Dr. Milam S. Cotten will remain in the eyes of his patients, the memories of colleagues and the hearts of family and friends.

"If he had an enemy, I've never met them," said Dr. Lynn McMahan, who was Cotten's partner at Southern Eye Center in Hattiesburg for nearly 20 years and had known him for twice that long. "He was the best of the best."

Cotten passed away at a hospice at St. Catherine's Village in Madison, about nine months after being diagnosed with cancer. He was 77 years old.

"You know, as a doctor, he kept people out of pain, and we were blessed because, up until the last few weeks, he was pretty much able to do what he wanted to do." said Miles Cotten, the eldest of Milam and Betty Cotten's three children.

"But he always felt like he was very blessed, and he wanted to give back."

And for those who knew him best, he did that and then some.

"Milam was one of those people who lived to serve," said Hattiesburg attorney Mike Ratliff, who got to know Cotten through the Rotary Club of Hattiesburg. "The motto of the club is, 'Service Above Self,' and he had gifts that he developed, and then donated those gifts to others."

Born in McComb, Cotten graduated from the University of Southern Mississippi and then went on to the University of Mississippi's medical school in Jackson, graduating in 1959.

After a hitch in the Navy as ship's physician on a nuclear-powered destroyer, he started his civilian medical career as a general practitioner in Moss Point.

That was followed by a move to Memphis, Tenn., where he re-entered school at the University of Tennessee to specialize in ophthalmology.

He moved his family to Hattiesburg in 1970.

Dr. Thad Waites, who first met Cotten after arriving in Hattiesburg in 1987, called his friend "a man of disparate inter-

"He operated on eyes, and he welded," Waites said. "He loved opera and world championship wrestling. His interests were often 180 degrees apart."

Visitation will be Saturday (February 11th) from 2pm-6pm. The funeral service will be Sunday (February 12th) at 2pm. Both the visitation and funeral service will be held at First Presbyterian Church.



Mike Ratliff provided a status update on fellow Rotarian Dr. Milam Cotten, who has been battling cancer at St. Catherine's Village in Madison. His wife, Betty, reported that he is making the transition slowly. The Club's prayers go out to the Cotten family.

Robert announced that Greg Buie has tendered his membership resignation due to a job change and that Bill MacLauchlan has generously agreed to fill the remainder of Greg's term on the Board of Directors. Scott Hummel will be leaving soon for a mission trip to Calcutta, India with a group of about 12 students from William Carey University. Good luck and safe travels to Scott and his group. The next Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for Monday, February 27, at William Carey. Dinner planned for 5:30pm, meeting at 6pm.

Aaron Ladner introduced today's speaker, Dr. Janet Williams, Dean of Nursing at William Carey University. A native of the Gulf Coast (in the Woolmarket area), Dr. Williams received her BSN from USM. While working as a critical care nurse and nurse manager, she continued in graduate school to earn her MSN from UAB and her MBA from USA. After joining the staff at WCU, Dr. Williams returned to USM and earned her PhD in Higher Education and Leadership.

President Robert Cummings, Jr. presided over the meet- Dr. Williams has served at WCU for 21 years and became the Dean of Nursing last year. She was recently named Woman of Excellence in Education for 2011 and has been nominated as Nursing School Administrator of the Year with the Mississippi Nurses Association.

> She said the WCU Nursing Program originally started at the New Orleans campus back in the 1980's and has continued to prosper at all 3 locations today---New Orleans, Gulf Coast, & Hattiesburg campuses. The program currently has approximately 800 declared nursing majors, including pre-nursing, and a Masters Program is expected to be offered in August 2012.

> "It's important that we continue to strive to be a part of nursing's future, not just nursing's past," she said. "We're working with the Institute of Medicine to insure that our future nurses keep up." The continuing education requirements for nurses include 10 CEU's per/year, which can be expensive. Therefore, she said, they decided to bring in speakers themselves as an economical way to meet the requirement at an estimated cost of less than \$100 per faculty member.

> Dr. Williams said the dire economy also has an impact on nursing. While the field is far from saturated, with plenty of room for nursing jobs to grow, the spouses of nurses can sometimes struggle to find employment in this economy so it makes it hard on their families. She said the future of nursing is still very bright and the program continues to grow with the body of knowledge available. The field of nursing is moving more into the community with evaluation and assessment of care and patient teaching programs.
