

MINUTES FROM 12/08/2009

President Mary Cromartie presided over the meet-

Steve Ramp gave the invocation and David Toms led the club in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mary then led the club in and the Four Way Test.

Gene Owens introduced a number of visiting Rotarians and guests of Rotary members. They were all welcomed.

Thanks to Conrad Welker and Annie Wimbish who served as our greeters.

Members were reminded to check the SPOKES for the Salvation Army Bell Ringing schedule. They were also reminded about the details of the December 15th Christmas Party. Mary also let members know that there would be no lunch meetings for the remainder of the month.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

Mary then introduced today's guest speaker, Blake Wilson, President of the Mississippi Economic Council. Blake opened the meeting by thanking the Hattiesburg Rotary Club for sharing the meeting with the MEC and for going to the trouble of moving the meeting location in order to accommodate the meeting.

Mr. Wilson's presentation is one of the last three Transformation Tour entitled; "Turning Challenges into Opportunities." By video those in attendance heard from Lt. Governor Phil Bryant, Representative Percy Watson, Chair of the House Ways and Means Committee, Delbert Hoseman, Secretary of State, and Hank Bounds with the Institutions of Higher Learning, Additionally former Secretary of State Erik Clark attended and addressed the audience.

Mr. Wilson noted that the mission of the Mississippi Economic Council is to find solutions to current and anticipated problems facing Mississippians and the business community.

Lt. Governor Bryant spoke to the challenges the legislature will face in the coming months as they try to hammer out a working budget in the aftermath of a bad recession. He suggested changes be made in the antiquated budget system currently being used by state government. He will push for a strategic planning process throughout the state that will allow future budgets to be tied to performance. He also will promote targeted tax cuts in the coming legislation session to help generate jobs and

increased business opportunities.

Representative Watson also spoke to the serious budget challenges that lawmakers will face. He suggested that the legislature look for ways to get people back to work which will create economic growth which will increase government revenues.

Secretary of State Hoseman addressed the legislation that his office will sponsor in the coming sessions to help make Mississippi more competitive. He plans a total revision of the Limited Liability acts. He also plans to introduce a uniform commercial code and a new "Workout Tool" that will help businesses avoid bankruptcy in bad economic

Blake introduced the plans to prospectively eliminate the inventory tax, which he says is a stumbling block for new businesses in our state. Rather than eliminate the tax and cause a county budget deficit, the tax would be eliminated when revenue increases enough to cover the lost income.

The MEC will also push for a 30 retirement program for teachers. He maintains that we are losing good, quality teachers after only 25 years of service who go on to teach in private schools or to teach in other states. The 30 retirement system would help keep these teachers in the public school system.

Dr. Clark addressed the needs of the state's Community College System. He maintains that community colleges are Mississippi's hidden treasurer. More than 225,000 Mississippians will receive education and training through that system this year. Enrollment is up 40% in the last two years. For every tax dollar spent on education in the state the Community College System on receives \$.07.

Other areas the MEC will be working on in the coming months include improvements in the state's early education system. A three-year pilot program related to this challenge is currently underway. Early childhood education is a building block to a engaged and more productive, future workforce. Finally, MEC will address the serious needs of our state's highways and bridges. It was noted that 42% of the state's bridges are in acceptable condition. The national goal is 75%. More than 4,200 Mississippi bridges currently need to be repaired or replaced. Attention to this issue is important economically to our state. The transportation industry in Mississippi accounts for 42,000 jobs and is a one-billion dollar industry. Mary thanked Blake for today's program and adjourned the meeting with our motto; "service above self."

Bio of Mark A. Taylor

Mark A. Taylor, a native of Laurel, Mississippi, is in his twenty-second year at Jones County Junior College. This marks his eighteenth year as Director of Choral Activities. He holds the Doctor of Arts in Music Education and a Master of Music in Applied Vocal Performance from the University of Mississippi. He received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Southern Mississippi. Dr. Taylor has been privileged to conduct the Jones Concert Choir in Carnegie Hall on two occasions. His choirs have sung with the New England Symphonic Ensemble, the Annapolis Chamber Orchestra, the Atlanta Ballet, the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, the Kent (Michigan) Philharmonia Orchestra, the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, the Meridian Symphony Orchestra, and the Gulf Coast (MS) Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to conducting the Concert Choir, Dr. Taylor is the dean of the Charles Pickering Honors Institute at Jones. He is active as an adjudicator, clinician, and church musician. He is the Worship Pastor at the East Campus of Temple Baptist Church in Hattiesburg. Dr. Taylor and his wife Leshia reside in Ellisville and have two sons.
