MINUTES FROM 12/16/2008

President Richard Topp presided over the meeting. Tom Montgomery gave the invocation. Johnny Stevens then led members in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Gene Owens welcomed today's visiting Rotarians and quests.

Pierce Stevens attended from the Petal Club.

Cario Armstrong was a guest of Valerie Sartin.

Maura McLaughlin was then introduced to provide today's Rotary minute. She reported that the Hattiesburg Rotary Club has contributed \$236,000 to the Rotary Foundation. Fifty-five club members are Paul Harris Fellows, while sixty-five have yet to make the commitment. She encouraged every member to make a Paul Harris Fellowship pledge. Members can contribute \$1,000 immediately or they can contribute \$100 a year for the next ten years. Money from the Foundation is used to further Rotary's causes worldwide, including providing hurricane relief to Katrina victims right here in Mississippi.

Steve Ramp was then introduced to induct two new members. Ryan Israel and Tom Montgomery were welcomed to the Club.

Topp thanked Club members who assisted with the Salvation Army's bell ringing activity. The Club generated \$1,394.70 during the campaign. Members who did not participate were reminded that they could still write a check to the Salvation Army as well as provide gifts for children.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

John McDaniels was then introduced. He then introduced Dr. Richard Clatterbuck and his wife Vicki. Richard is a staff neurosurgeon at the Hattiesburg Clinic and Forrest General Hospital.

Rick recently spent a 90 day tour of duty in Iraq. As a medical reserve member, their tour of duty is 90 days on assignment when called up. He served in the Logistic Support Area known as Anaconda. He named today's programs "90 Days in the Belly of the Snake". Anaconda is located in a strategic position in the war zone and has at almost any time a population of between 30 and 40 thousand residents.

He provided Club members with many photographs if the Anaconda hospital and base. He also was able to share stories of many of his patient encounters while there. His team received recognition during their service because of their survivor rate. An American soldier who made it to their hospital had a 98 percent survival rate. Most patients who enter the facility are air lifted out within approximately 12 hours. They are then transported to Germany and from there on to further treatment. Rick estimates that he performed up to 50 surgeries during his tour.
