# ShelterBox in Haiti

After 10 years of bringing aid to thousands of disaster victims, Shelter-Box faced its most daunting challenge yet after a powerful earthquake rocked Haiti on 12 January, plunging the struggling nation into one of the worst humanitarian crises on record.

The quake, the nation's strongest in more than 200 years, killed at least 200,000 people and left more than one million homeless and in desperate need of food and shelter. The ground support that Shelter-Box deployed days after the quake struck was unmatched by anything the organization had done before.

"This is the largest, quickest, and most complex deployment in our history. We organized across four countries to get ShelterBoxes to the people of Haiti quickly," says John Leach, head of operations.

With most of the capital, Port-au-Prince, flattened, hospitals were in dire need of shelter for victims. Hundreds of tents were used as emergency shelter for postoperative patients.

Founded by Tom Henderson, of the Rotary Club of Cober Valley Helston, England, in 1999, ShelterBox is a Rotarian- and Rotary clubsupported nonprofit that brings shelter, water, and comfort to victims of disaster and conflict. Each 49-gallon box is packed with necessities such as tents big enough for 10 people, blankets, water purification tablets, cooking supplies, and tools.

At press time, more than 10,000 containers had been distributed in Haiti. In the last decade, ShelterBox has responded to more than 100 crises in over 60 countries, with support from Rotary clubs around the world.

In addition to immediate and obvious consequences such as property damage and death, disasters contribute to serious longterm economic losses. Over the past few decades, those losses have multiplied because of population increases and a rise in weatherrelated crises.

Because the majority of the people devastated by natural catastrophes live in the developing world, the poor are disproportionately affected. Data from the Centre for Research on the Epidemiology of Disasters indicate that from 1991 to 2005, the greatest number of people affected by disaster lived in Asia and Oceania, regions that encompass more than 30 percent of the world's least-developed countries.

The 12 January catastrophe in Haiti reminds us that, in the developing world, disasters worsen already diminished living conditions and exacerbate poverty. The aftermath can take years, even decades, to reverse.

"A number of effects are felt very early on that linger for many years,"

#### LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

Mike Ratliff introduced today's guest speaker – Chester (Bo) Morgan. Dr. Morgan is a Professor of History at the University of Southern MS. Born and raised in Hattiesburg, Bo received his B.S. in history from USM in 1971 and his M.S. in history in 1974. He then earned his Ph.D in history from Memphis State University in 1982. Bo has written, and had published, several books, including Redneck Liberal: Theodore G. Bilbo and the New Deal, 1985, Dearly Bought, Deeply Treasured: The University of Southern Mississippi, 1987, and Treasured Past, Golden Future: The Centennial History of USM, 2010. He also has another manuscript in progress for the Mississippi Historical Society.

Bo's writings present the very humorous side of politics and oratory (the art of public speaking). He uses the quotes and the written letters of many famous political figures and authors. For example, W.J. Cash wrote in a book published in 1941 entitled The Mind of the South - "Mississippi – too small to be a country, but too big to be an insane asylum".

Bo's first book, Redneck Liberal, included many funny quotes and letters from the era of the New Deal, involving President Franklin Roosevelt and Theodore Bilbo, who served twice as a Mississippi governor, and also as a Mississippi U.S. Senator from 1935-1947. Bo shared with our club members many of the humorous writings and quotations from that time period that were included in his book. Club members were enjoying Bo's quips, which included a newspaper quote from the editor of the Jackson Daily News "that with Bilbo as governor, the eagle on the dome of the state capitol should be replaced with a 'puking buzzard'."

Bill thanked Dr. Morgan for his very entertaining presentation which gave members a different view into the world of politics. He then adjourned the meeting with our motto: Service above Self.

### TODAY'S PROGRAM

#### Bio of Ken Thompson

Ken is the area representative of ShelterBox, USA. Ken received a BS degree from the University of Texas in electrical engineering and an MBA from the University of Michigan. He is a retired petroleum engineer and stockbroker, the former assistant Director of Community Christian Concern, Chairman of the Slidell Heritage Festival, and 2012 Retreat Leader for Kairos Prison Ministries. Ken is active in Rotary as the past President of the Rotary Club of Slidell Northshore, and currently District 6840 Web Coordinator.

His program will discuss ShelterBox, USA's role in assisting the people of Haiti following the January earth-quake and the ten-year history of ShelterBox, a program started by Tom Henderson, a Rotarian and former Royal Navy search and rescue diver. He saw that the aid response to most disasters was in the form of food and medicine to help people survive the immediate aftermath.

Little or no assistance was given in terms of proper shelter to help them through the first few days, weeks and months as they tried to rebuild their lives. ShelterBox was launched to fill that void.

ShelterBox has become the largest Rotary club project in the world, with affiliates in eight countries. The first consignment of 143 boxes went to earthquake victims in the Indian state of Gujarat in January 2001. Over the next three years the project matured and by the end of 2004 nearly 2,600 boxes had been dispatched, following 16 major disasters. Since then, ShelterBox has responded to earthquakes, volcanoes, floods, typhoons, and conflicts, including the devastating Indian Ocean Tsunami, Hurricane Katrina, the massive earthquake in the Kashmir region of Pakistan, as well as the Haitian disaster.
