MINUTES FROM 05/31/11

President Bill McLeod presided over today's meeting.

Scott Hummel provided the invocation and Wes Brooks led the club in the Pledge of Allegiance. Bill then led members in the Four Way Test.

Special thanks to our greeters today who were Chris Price and Jared Eastlack.

Wes Brooks thanked those who participate in today's opening ceremonies and asked that others volunteer to assist in the coming weeks. He the introduced today's visiting Rotarian, Dr. Milton Wheeler. Allen Anderson introduced his guest today, Ken Forester.

Scott Hummel then conducted the drawing for today's Rotary Foundation raffle prize. The prize was contributed by Steve Ramp and won by Mike Bonnette.

Robert Cummings gave members a brief membership update. Our club now has 112 members. A new member will soon be proposed and Tom Potter has announced his resignation as of June 1. Thirty-three members had perfect attendance in April. Robert noted that Reading Between the Lions counts as a meeting make up. He also noted that you can make up meetings on-line through the District's website.

The June 28 meeting is the date set aside for the installation of new officers and directors. Rotary award winners will also be recognized at that meeting.

The June board meeting will be held on June 27th at 6 p.m.

Janice Touchstone reminded members who have not yet made their annual \$33 Polio Plus contribution that the contribution should be made before the end of the year. It was noted that if everyone paid their fair share for this campaign that the club could also make a Paul Harris Fellowship contribution in the name of Sonny Cotton.

Walley Weakley gave a recap of the recently concluded Rotary International convention. He thanked those who were involved as volunteers and for those who attended.

5/31/11 PROGRAM SUMMARY

Janice Touchstone came forward and introduced today's speaker, Rotary District 6840's membership committee chair Brian Hall. Brian is a member of the Covington, LA Rotary club.

Brian reported that the official attendance count for the New Orleans Rotary International Convention is now 19,200. He anticipates that number will rise to about 19,800 when all the paperwork is finalized.

Brian spoke to club members are the need for Rotary focus on membership retention as a priority. He noted that Rotary ad 1.2 million members some ten years ago. Today that number still stands at 1.2 million however there has been a 1.2 million turnover in members during that same ten year period. Rotary has clubs in 200 nations worldwide.

Brain noted that Rotary was founded to provide fellowship for members. Fellowship remains as a primary reason for belonging to a club. Secondly, the club's founders perceived that Rotary would be a way to build your business. Again, business building continues to be a primary reason for belonging. Service is also another reason Rotary was founded and service remains as a primary function of Rotary membership.

Noting that every project is local, Brain pointed out that the contributions made by Rotary are worldwide. He gave Katrina relief as an example. Although Katrina recovery was a local issue, money from around the world was focused on this project through the Rotary Foundation and individual club contributions. The Foundation provided \$180 million in donations throughout the world last year for local projects.

With a membership of 1.2 million, Rotary is as large as the number of WalMart employees worldwide. The club is also the size of the population of Dallas. Brian noted that if 1.2 million club members contributed just 40 hours of service each year the value would be 48 million hours at \$350 million using minimum wage standards.

Brian concluded his comments by asking each member to identify the reason they joined Rotary and then to plug in and get involved. He stated, "You have an amazing opportunity". He also noted that if a club is involved in local service projects, the club will attract new members.

06/07/11 PROGRAM SUMMARY

Greg Buie, who was the Night-in-Italy Chairperson, introduced today's guest speaker, Margaret Buttross Brinegar. Margaret serves as Director for The Children's Center for Communication & Development at USM. She has worked as a speech-language pathologist in early intervention for the last 30 years. She is currently an active member of the Early Intervention Group with the MS Dept. of Education and serves on the MS Early Intervention Coordinating Council.

Margaret provided a video for the members to watch. The video showed the children and the teachers interacting during their time at the center and also interviewed several of the parents and the teachers. The center provides care, support, and services to children throughout the entire state of Mississippi, from infancy through age 5, and who have communication and developmental disabilities.

This Center pioneered the way for the state of Mississippi to be able to provide intervention for the families of these children. A team of different training-specialists, such as physical therapists, behavioral therapists, communication therapists, and special education teachers, all combine as one unit to serve the children in so many different ways and to help each child reach their optimal potential. All of the teachers are USM students who are in actual training to become future teachers and therapists.

The Center has a nice set-up with USM that works nicely because they are allocated the space without having to pay rent or utilities, and in exchange they train the student teachers for free. But there are many other expenses, and sadly, state funding by the Department of Education has been dramatically cut lately, so every donation made by people and organizations of the community are especially appreciated. Without the extra funds, the center could not go on. Margaret wants everyone to know how much difference the Rotary Club has made with all of its donations over the last seven years!

Christy Raiford and her son Bentley have been with the center for several years and were at today's luncheon. Christy said that when her son was born, she had no hope that Bentley would be able to communicate or learn anything. The Center has made such a huge difference in their lives because Bentley has learned so much and can communicate quite nicely now. Christy thanked the Club for its generosity and support and she knows that the members all realize the importance of helping others out. After all, she says, these children will grow up to be pro-active members of society as well.

Bill thanked Margaret for her presentation and thanked Christy and Bentley for coming. He then announced that the Reading Between the Lions program is still in great need of volunteers. Remember that your attendance at any of these sessions will count as a make-up meeting. He also noted that volunteers are getting harder to find for our weekly luncheons to fill the slots of Invocation, Pledge, and Door Greeters.
