# LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

Erin Granberry introduced the speaker, Rick Looser.

Rick began his working career at Dunn Landscaping in Alabama. He graduated from the University of Alabama and his first real job in public relations was with the Alabama Poison Control Unit. That unit was investigated by 60 Minutes.

Rick is the founder of The Cirlot Agency, Incorporated, a Mississippi based public relations and advertising agency.

The Cirlot Agency has created an advertising campaign that has the goal of changing minds about Mississippi. "Yes, we can read. A few of us can even write." is one of the slogans used in the ad series. That particular advertisement ends with photos of well known authors who lived and wrote in Mississippi, including Tennessee Williams, Nevada Barr, Willie Morris, Eudora Welty and William Faulker, just to name a few. The text of the ad goes on to say, "From Pulitzer Prize winners to revolutionaries who initiated momentous cultural change .. oh, yes, Mississippians can write. No other state in the country can claim as many honored, awarded and

revered writers as Mississippi. Yes, Mississippi. Where words transcend.

Rick began this campaign on an airplane coming back from Washington when he struck up a conversation with a twelve-year-old. Rick says the youngster asked him if he saw those KKK people on his street every day and if everyone in Mississippi still hates Black people. Rick says that's the notion the child had of Mississippi and one that he had gotten from watching movies and television. At that point, Rick thought it was time something started to happen to change opinions about our state, especially if children as young as twelve already had such mind-sets about out state.

The advertising campaign has been free to the people of our state. Rick estimates that his agency has invested approximately \$300,000 in time and expenses to the campaign. The hard work and the investment seem to be paying off, because the campaign has received notice by a growing number of national media representatives. He's been interviewed by NBC for the Today Show and expects that the segment will run within the next two weeks.

Why did he undertake this challenge? "I did it because it needed doing," according to Rick. He challenged Rotarians to find something that they are not now doing and begin doing it, simply because it needs to be done.

The Cirlot Agency campaign isn't for sale. Rick says he didn't think the agency could tell the entire truth about our state if a corporate sponsor or the government had a vested interest in the campaign.

The second annual Young Authors Celebration was on the Hattiesburg Campus of William Carey University on Friday, February 23<sup>rd</sup>. Three hundred and fifty students from grades one through eight representing 15 schools and 6 districts attended. They met the fourteen authors/illustrators and then shared their own books that they had written and illustrated in a writer's workshop conducted in different classrooms throughout the university campus. They had lunch on the campus and made a visit to the bookstore to purchase the books that the authors had written. Copies of each child's book will be placed into the MS Treasury of Young Authors and Illustrators website for children to view. Each child received a gift bag with a book, coupons, pens and pencils. Also each student was given a t-shirt to wear to the Celebration. Dr. Morris visited each classroom to speak to the students about writing before they attended the Celebration.

Dr. Barry Morris has been in education for the past 35 years in elementary and middle schools and at the university. Serving as a classroom teacher for 25 years, Dr. Morris completed his Ph.D. in Elementary Curriculum and Instruction at the University of South Florida. He serves as the Chairman of the Department of Education at William Carey University. He and his wife, Ann, live in Collins.

Dr. June Hornsby taught for five years in the elementary schools of Montana, Mississippi and

Louisiana. She been teaching graduate and undergraduate classes and has been Director of Student Teaching at William Carey since 1992. She received an Ed.D. in Elementary Education Curriculum and Instruction from USM. June and her husband, Ben, live in Hattiesburg.

resolution represent the educational and peace initiatives to which The Rotary Foundation has given priority in the area of educational programs.

The six Rotary Centers for International Studies operate in collaboration with seven prestigious universities worldwide. The Rotary Foundation sponsors up to 60 Rotary World Peace Fellows who enroll in a two-year master's degree program at one of the Rotary Centers — as many as 10 fellows per center — to focus on international relations and the achievement of peace and conflict resolution. Each center organizes an annual seminar where the fellows present their research and projects concerning peace, goodwill, and international understanding. This research is publicized throughout the Rotary world and by international media.

These fellowships are financed with donations from the districts, individual Rotarians, and the World Fund. The Trustees of The Rotary Foundation have approved a plan to raise US\$95 million by 30 June 2015, to establish a fund to ensure financing for the Rotary Centers program in perpetuity.

Today, there are 285 former and current Rotary World Peace Fellows, and more than 200 of them will gather 14-16 June for the Rotary World Peace Symposium in Salt Lake City, Utah, USA. This event, part of the annual RI Convention, will focus on academics, with the direct participation of Rotarians and peace fellows. This is a unique opportunity to observe the amazing progress of the Rotary Centers program. The symposium will include excellent speakers and allow fellows and Rotarians ample time to interact. I urge you all to participate in this meeting. Witnessing the exceptional achievements of our fellows firsthand is certain to renew your confidence.

The Rotary Centers represent Rotary's commitment to the cause of world peace and understanding by contributing to the formation of the next generation of community and world leaders dedicated to mediating, preventing, and solving world conflicts, and tackling the difficult problems that cause them. Based on what we have achieved thus far, we are definitely headed in the right direction.
