Minutes: March 24, 2015

President Wes Brooks presided over the meeting. Thanks to Jaclyn Adams who gave the invocation and to Ashley Read who led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Thanks to Dean Wade for serving as our greeter today.

Sean Priebe stood in for Aaron Ladner and introduced today's guests and thanked those who participated in today's meeting. Stewart Dern is a guest of Jaclyn Adams at today's meeting. There were no visiting Rotarians.

Erin Granberry reminded members about making their Rotary Foundation contributions before the end of the fiscal year, June 30. She noted that approximately 10 Rotarians are taking advantage of the double match points and will be making their contribution before the end of March.

Wes reminded members of the need to register for the District Conference. Registration is available through either the club's website or the District's website.

The Night in Italy event is scheduled for April 21. Anyone who has Rotary aprons is encouraged to bring those to Bill MacLauchlan so he can get them ready for the event. Jerome Brown then introduced today's guest speaker, Jermaine Brown who is the principal at Hattiesburg High School.

Jermaine accepted his new position within the past two years. He says the first year he spent in the realm of management. This year his focus is on the leadership phase. He encourages all of Hattiesburg High students to strive to be great, not just good. If they miss the mark they at least succeed at the good level.

There are a total of 90 teachers at Hattiesburg High. Of those, 88 are listed as highly qualified. That means they have the necessary degrees in their field and are certified to teach in that field by the state of Mississippi. The other two have the necessary degrees or are pursuing their degrees and licensure.

Jermaine maintains that everyone in the Hattiesburg area has a vested interest in the school and its students. A strong high school will mean a stronger and more competitive economy and society. He also maintains that there are many unmet needs of Hattiesburg High students that must be met before the teaching and learning process can be successful. If the children are hungry or unhealthy the teachers face even bigger challenges in the educational process. Work continues to try and meet as many of these unmet needs as possible.

The Hattiesburg High students are focused on the "right now", according to Jermaine. The challenge for school administrators, staff and instructors is to get them focused on the "tomorrow." What does tomorrow look like for the students if they don't graduate high school? The teachers are challenged to make their instructions relevant to the students.

Jermaine says he has two primary areas of focus. The first is to get the students to graduate. The second focus is to get them career ready.

In the focus for career ready he has created five academies. The first is the Freshmen Academy. There are also academies in Engineering and Management, Arts and Humanities, Business and Health and Human Services. The academies are like schools within the school where the students can focus on their specific interest area.

Volunteers are needed to make the academies successful according to Brown. Students learn about becoming a CPA or an attorney or a doctor or some other profession but many of them never encounter a real, life experience of being around a professional. Brown encouraged all Rotarians and especially all of them who graduated from Hattiesburg High to consider becoming a volunteer in one of these academies. The extra curricula programs at Hattiesburg High continue to be successful, including the band which participated in a recent Mardi Gras parade. The orchestra will leave in a few days for the Caribbean where they will be the featured entertainment on a cruise ship. The speech and debate program continues to be recognized at the state and national level. The basketball team recently made it to the elite eight.

The new Smokey Harrington stadium is slated to be open in the next few weeks. The facility was heavily damaged in the recent tornado and has undergone a 2.6 million dollar renovation. Jermaine says it will be an exciting experience for the baseball team to finally have a home field to practice and play on.


DR. CYNTHIA SCOTT
