LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM SUMMARY

Brian Moore introduced today's guest speaker, Gene Dattel. Gene is a financial historian, lecturer, consultant, former investment banker and the author of two books, "The Sun That Never Rose" and "Cotton and Race in the Making of America". He studied history at Yale and law at Vanderbilt. Both his father and his brother have served as Rotary presidents.

Gene said that if you think of the power that the oil industry has on America today, that is the same power that the cotton industry had in the 19th century. Cotton played a key role in America's economic and racial history. Cotton was the foundation of the Industrial Revolution in Great Britain. As the young economist Karl Marx remarked in 1848, "Without cotton, vou have no modern industry...without slavery, you have no cotton."

On the eve of the Civil War, cotton was America's leading export and raw cotton was essential for the economy of Europe. Most of the world supply of cotton came from the American South. This industry, fueled by the labor of slaves on plantations, generated huge sums of money for the United States and influenced the nation's ability to borrow money in a global market. Mississippi, the nation's largest cotton-producing state, was economically and politically dependent on cotton, as was the entire South. When the southern states seceded from the Union to form the Confederate States of America in 1861, they used cotton to provide revenue for its government, arms for its military, and the economic power for the fledgling Confederate nation. The North needed cotton for its textile mills, and it wanted to deprive the South of its financing power.

After the Civil War, African-Americans remained in the cotton fields, as the textile was still an economic force. But they were denied economic and physical mobility by federal government policy, by the racial animosity of Northern whites, and by the enduring need for cotton labor in the South. The government was forced to confront the question of what to do with slave refugees and those who had escaped behind Union lines. In 1863 they developed a form of containment policy, whereby freed slaves would remain in the South. They would be used in the military service, or contracted to work on the abandoned plantations. For more than 150 years, America benefited enormously from cotton picked by African-Americans. Cotton needed a work force, and white America designated African-Americans in that labor role. Slave-produced cotton was important to the destiny of America and it almost destroyed the nation. The nation's attachment to material goods and progress was at the cost and value of human beings. Wherever Gene speaks, he always asks people two questions: What do you think of slavery? What do you think of black people?

Bill thanked Gene for his presentation and adjourned the meeting with our motto: Service Above Self.
