Rotarians gearing up for World Polio Day

Rotarians around the globe are planning events to raise polio eradication awareness and funding for World Polio Day on 24 October.

Australian club members are working with the Global Poverty Project on a petition drive aimed at persuading world leaders to fully fund the critical work of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Supporters can sign the petition online.

The Global Poverty Project has scheduled an End of Polio Concert on 28 October to coincide with the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting in Perth, Australia. Rotarians have joined with the group to lobby leaders to put polio eradication on the meeting agenda. Hugh Evans, cofounder and CEO of the Global Poverty Project, is a scheduled speaker at the 2012 RI Convention in Bangkok, Thailand, in May.

"Global collaboration has ensured that eradication is within reach," says Michael Sheldrick, the group's polio campaign manager and a member of the Rotary Club of Crawley, Western Australia. "Our generation has a chance to realize a historic opportunity and ensure that no one else ever has to fear this disease. That's why it's vital we commit to finish the job."

Among other events planned around World Polio Day are these:

- Rotarians in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, are organizing a Walk to End Polio Now, aimed at drawing 4,000 participants and raising money for Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge to match \$355 million in grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in support of polio eradication.
- The Rotary Club of Venezia-Riviera del Brenta, Italy, has organized a Run to End Polio fundraiser as part of the 23 October Venice Marathon.

Today's speaker, Rick Duke, also introduced Alison Crumpton and Jayson Newell from the University of Southern Mississippi as his guests.

Robert announced that the board meeting is set for October 24th at the United Way's office in downtown Hattiesburg. Refreshment will be available beginning at 5:15 and the meeting will begin at 5:45.

Maura McLaughlin reported that the Club has 102 members. The meeting attendance rate for last month was only 57%. She encouraged members to attend regularly. PROGRAM SUMMARY

Betsy Rowell then introduced today's guest speaker, Rick Duke. Rick is Director of the Trent Lott National Center for Excellence in Economic Development and Entrepreneurship. He is also a Professor of Practice in the Department of Economic & Workforce Development.

The focal point of the activities associated with the Center is to engage the University of Southern Mississippi with the community in economic development opportunities. "Knowledge led economic development" is the description of the type of influence that Rick believes the Center and offer to our economy.

Rick invited members to attend the second IMPACT program that will be held at the Center on January 26, 2012. There is a \$45 registration fee and lunch will be included. The program will feature a number of nationally known speakers. The focus of the 2012 IMPACT program will be the economic outlook for this part of Mississippi.

Rick's presentation focused on the University's efforts to revitalize what has become known as the "Mid-Town" area of Hattiesburg. Mid Town is described as an area bordered by Highway 49, Hardy Street, Adeline and 31st Avenue. Conceptually the re-development of the area would turn it into a mixed use, walkable, social environment for area residents. Rick maintains that if the project is successful it will bring increased economic development to the Mid Town area as well as the Hardy Street Corridor and will then tie into the development that continues in the downtown area. He maintains that the project will set the environment for economic development far greater than can currently be imagined. The project is now going through a series of public meetings were residents have an opportunity to express their concerns and those involved in the project and inform citizens of the scope and plans for the conceptual project. The master plan for the Mid Town project is expected to be completed by May, 2012.

Rick also noted that he expects to see a Request for Proposals to be released within the next few weeks for the old Elam Arms dorm on Hardy Street. The current plans are for the development of a hotel with a restaurant and other businesses.
