Sean also reminded members of the upcoming BIKE-A-THON. Volunteer sheets are now available for sign-ups. All members are encouraged to register to ride, to volunteer and to provide some form of sponsorship. Sean thanked Dan Davis and Erin Granberry for heading up the Rotary Foundation this year.

Faye Gilbert then introduced today's guest speaker. Chief Robert Hopkins of the University of Southern Mississippi Police Department. Chief Hopkins is the longest serving Chief of Police on record at the university, serving 16 years. He stated that his years of service and police success is due to community support.

The mission of The University of Southern Mississippi Police Department is to provide a safe living, learning and working environment for USM students, faculty and staff. They are committed to preventing crime and protecting people and property. They are there to help maintain peace, order and safety and to enforce the laws and rules of the university.

The Police Department investigates problems and incidents, and assists students and staff with everyday problems such as, being locked out of their cars, dead batteries, running out of gas and medical situations. On any given Saturday, they open approximately 250 rooms on campus for ACT tests.

The University of Southern Mississippi Police Department if a fully recognized law enforcement agency by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. "Our officers are highly trained and capable of responding to all types of emergencies that would include the active threat such as a shooter", according to Chief Hopkins.

Officers train for specific types of situations and participate in regular training exercises. USMPD has local agreements with the Hattiesburg Police Department, Hattiesburg Fire/Haz Mat, Forrest County Sheriff's Office, Lamar County Sheriff's Office, Petal Police Department, Forrest General Hospital, and the Forrest County Emergency Operation Center. If the emergency or crisis calls for additional assistance all of these agencies are prepared to respond to USMPD call for assistance. Chief Hopkins says, "While we hope that our emergency plans will not have to be put into action, USMPD is prepared to handle any situation that may arise."

If there is an emergency crisis on campus, the following communication systems can be used: E-mail alerts to all faculty, staff, and students, USM

web page, Phone messaging system, Voice messaging utilizing alert siren, Media alerts to local TV and radio outlets.

You can also download the 2014-15 Annual Security and Fire Safety Report on the website that contains instructions on whom to call in an Emergency, what to Do in an Emergency, emergency response and evacuation procedures, reporting a crime and campus safety tips.



Dr. Griffith graduated as an Echol's scholar from the University of Virginia. He attended medical school at Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center in Shreveport, where he earned a Master of Science degree in neuropharmacology. During his residency at LSUHSC, Dr. Griffith served as Chief Resident. He then completed fellowship training in cornea and refractive surgery at Eye Consultants of Atlanta, Georgia. He is a member of the American Academy of Ophthalmology, the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery, as well as the Society for Excellence in Eyecare.



Dr. Griffith was among the first in Mississippi to perform 1-Visit Blade-free LASIK and also Blade-free Cataract procedures. He is the pioneer in the tri-state area to offer LipiFlow®, a treatment for dry eye syndrome. Dr. Griffith was recognized by the Mississippi Business Journal as a "Mississippi Healthcare Hero" in 2011.
