MINUTES: JANUARY 12, 2016

President Sean Priebe presided over the meeting. Thanks to Rusty Edwards who gave the invocation and to Erin Granberry who led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Thanks to Gene Owens and Mary Cromartie who served as our greeters today.

Today's Mystery Rotarian was born in German and is of Irish and Indian decent. This Rotarian has lived in Hattiesburg for more than 18 years and graduated with a Bachelor's degree from USM and a Masters from William Carey University. This Rotarian has worked in commercial development, financial aide and was a high school teacher in Laurel. This Rotarian was just recently married. Today's mystery Rotarian is Chrissy Yelverton.

Sean reminded Rotarians of the District Conference which will be held on the coast April 7-10. Volunteers are needed to head up the club's food fest tent for this year. If you are interested, please see Sean.

He also noted that the Night in Italy event is quickly approaching. A chair or two co-chairs are needed for this project. Again, if you are interested, see Sean.

Wes Brooks then introduced today's guest speaker, Dickie Scruggs. Mr. Scruggs is a former attorney and Navy fighter pilot. He may be best known as the architect of the litigation that resulted in the multi-billion dollar Tobacco Settlement, and later for going to federal prison in a judicial bribery scandal.

Mr. Scruggs reports that 500,000 Mississippians do not have a high school diploma. That number by the way is the same number of Mississippians who are attending public school throughout the state. A total of 14,000 high school students drop out every year in Mississippi. That represents 77 drop outs for every school day throughout the year. Mississippi workforce participation rate is the second lowest in the nation at 56%. Scruggs notes that he and many other Mississippians are tired of these kinds of statistics continuing to drag our state and our state's economy down.

While serving his prison term he was asked to teach GED classes to fellow inmates. The inmate population has a median 6th grade reading level. Only one in 10 can read at the high school level. Teaching the inmates to successfully pass the GED became a challenge for Scruggs and he says provided him with a second chance.

When he had served his sentence he established Second Chance Mississippi. It is a non-profit foundation that raises funds to help adults who are participating in work force development programs throughout the state. Because the Community Colleges are in charge of adult education and skill training for work force development, Second Chance Mississippi is designed to support their efforts.

The GED curriculum was changed in 2014. Prior to the changes 8,000 Mississippians received their GED each year. In 2014 that number dropped to 800. It is beginning to increase but the process is a difficult one for adults who are trying to work or raise a family and take the required coursework.

Scruggs noted that many of those who are attending these GED or skill development classes are often just one flat tire away from having to drop out. Second Chance Mississippi brings churches and civic minded organizations together with their local Community Colleges and provides needed assistance to keep the students in class. There are little or no funds available to meet this need other than through the local communities.

Scruggs challenged our Rotary club to become a partner with the Pearl River Community College and be a resource for them when these needs arise. He introduced a number of Pearl River Community College representatives in attendance today and encouraged our members to meet and talk with them about ways we can help.
