Model U.N. Resolutions

Dale provided the full text of the two resolutions the students will be presenting in his email last week. Here's a quick look at the world issues the resolutions are intended to address.

Resolution #1

Specific Actions to Address Global Food Insecurity and its Disproportionate Impact on Women

This resolution notes that the number of people without access to adequate food has risen to 2.4 billion, nearly a third of the world's population, and between 720 million and 811 million people face hunger. Additionally, while women produce more than 50% of food worldwide, women and girls are disproportionately affected by food insecurity, hunger, malnutrition, and preventable diseases, in part due to gender inequality and discrimination.

Resolution #2

Prevention of an Arms Race in Space and Continued Peaceful and Sustainable Space Exploration

All member nations are obligated to observe the provisions of the U.N. Charter regarding the use or threat of use of force in their international relations, including in their space activities. Yet the 1967 U.N. Outer Space Treaty does not contain any provisions prohibiting placement of weapons in orbit or on celestial bodies. There has been rapid development of anti-satellite weapons which increases the risk of global conflict and has increased the number of objects in orbit by 20%. Nearly 6,000 tons of space debris is now in Low Earth Orbit endangering space flight and operational satellites.
