One of our primary objectives this year is to see that each one of us takes pleasure in the many aspects of our works (Projects) in the community. I really hope that through reading these communications, you are able to gain a sense of what is going on around the district and to enable those we are yet to visit, to plan better.

This past week got off to a good start with official visits to western Uganda Clubs. While In Kisoro, we participated in the sendoff (gukwa/kuhingira) of a daughter to Rotarian Peace (namesake). The meetings we held reiterated the strength of the family of Rotary, Rotarians were in charge. The congratulatory brunch with Rtn. Rosemary (RC Nalumunye) at her home in Kabale was mouthwatering as we pushed to Mbarara. The overarching objective of the Kangaroo Care Project at Mbarara Referral Hospital is to increase the chances of survival for preterm newborns in south-western Uganda which has now been achieved at 90%. The scene of a less than one kg human being with a hope of becoming an adult drove me close to tears. I want to congratulate the Rotary Club of Mbarara, our international partners and the hospital for utilizing the Global Grant to create impact.

I was all smiles when the Rotary Club of Mbarara Ranchers hosted our visit at Isingiro Prisons where we commissioned a water filtration system and watched as they extended probono legal and financial literacy services to the inmates in addition to a medical camp by Mbarara University of Science and Technology. Later that afternoon we celebrated with Rotary Club of Mbarara City as they devoted to nurturing education in the community by building a classroom block at Nyamiyaga Primary School.

The church service and a sounding home hospitality will remain on our mind. The Rotary Club of Mbarara East's focus on student's well-being as an integral part of any community health project was evidenced as we shared a dental health lesson and observed dental care delivery at Nganwa Primary School. In all this, Rotarians were the lawyers, teachers, financial advisors, engineers, and dentists that such communities don't easily access.

As we start a new month, it never ceases to surprise me how much support you have shown for the project that serves as our flagship endeavour in improving Maternal Child Health indicators. We came back with cash and pledges to support our mothers in pursuit of quality healthcare.

This year will go down in history as one that recognizes the importance of mothers and their roles in society as well as Rotarians as people of ACTION.

I hope that your membership in Rotary, especially in District 9214, brings you even more pride.

You lock your bedroom to protect your valuables but leave the baby with the maid!... You come home in the evening very tired, no time to spend with the kid. At one and a half years, the kid is taken to baby care institutions. The kid is left there in the morning till evening when the parents are back. You pick him up to take him home when he is asleep. Over the vacation you organise for tuition for the kids up to the last week. You only take them out for fun on the final weekend before they go back to school. What a Rotarian should know about Rotary

1- DEFINITION OF ROTARY

How do you describe the organization called "Rotary"? There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club as well as the activities of a million Rotarians. There are the features of service, internationality, fellowship, classifications of each vocation, development of goodwill and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people and many more descriptive qualities.

2 - ROTARY'S WHEEL EMBLEM

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians.

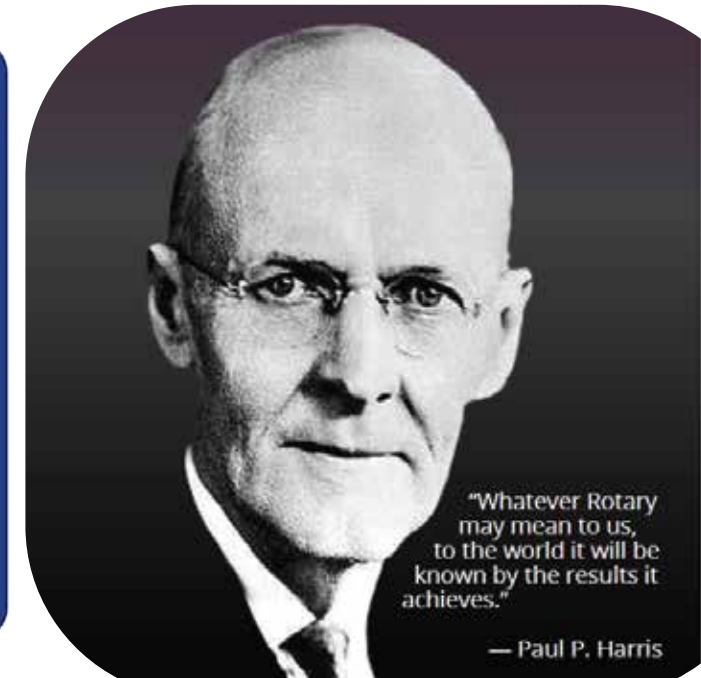
3 - OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is "to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise." The statement then lists four areas by which this "ideal of service" is fostered: "through the development of acquaintance as the opportunity for service; the promotion of high ethical standards in business and professions; through service in one's personal, business and community life; and the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace."

The Object of Rotary has not always been expressed in this manner. The original Constitution of 1906 had three objects: promotion of business interests, promotion of good fellowship and the advancement of the best interests of the community. By 1910 Rotary had five Objects as increased emphasis was given to expanding Rotary. By 1915 there were six Objects. In 1918 the Objects were rewritten again and reduced to four. Four years later they had again grown to six and were revised again in 1927.

Finally, at the 1935 Mexico City Convention the six Objects were restated and reduced to four. The last major change came in 1951, when the "Objects" were streamlined and changed to a single "Object" which is manifested in four separate ways. The "ideal of service" is the key phrase in the Object of Rotary. This ideal is an attitude of being a thoughtful and helpful person in all of one's endeavors. That's what the Object truly means.
