Hope for fighting a global scourge

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Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia is Rotary's first Programs of Scale grant recipient, and it is saving lives. Across two provinces of Zambia, 2,500 volunteer health workers have been selected by their communities. They are trained to bring medical care closer to those who need it, and they are able to diagnose and treat malaria and other ailments."

While sitting with a group of Rotary leaders outside of Lusaka, Zambia, I ask a question: "How many of you have ever had malaria?" Every hand in the room goes up. They even begin to tell me about the first, second, or third time they experienced the disease, one of the main causes of death and sickness in many developing countries.

They are fortunate. They have access to medical treatment and lifesaving medicines. For the people of rural Zambia, their story is very different.

On a wooden bench in a small village, I sit with Timothy and his young son Nathan. With a camera crew capturing our conversation, he tells me of the time Nathan showed signs of malaria. He brought the boy to the nearby home of a community health worker, where Nathan quickly received medicines that in all likelihood saved his life.

Calmly, Timothy tells me about his other son's bout with the disease a few years earlier. He had to race that son to a medical clinic more than 5 miles away. Riding a bike and carrying his child on his back, he tells

me, he could feel his son's legs turn cold and then his little body go limp. As he finally entered the clinic, he screamed for help, but it was too late. The camera stops rolling, and we sit in silence. He begins to weep, and I hold him tightly. "I lost my son, I lost my son," he says.

This story is all too familiar for the families we meet over the next few days. And yet there is hope. Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia is Rotary's first Programs of Scale grant recipient, and it is saving lives. Across two provinces of Zambia, 2,500 volunteer health workers have been selected by their communities. They are trained to bring medical care closer to those who need it, and they are able to diagnose and treat malaria and other ailments. I invite you to read in this issue about Rotary partnerships that create lasting change.

Message from **District Governor**

Dear fellow Rotarians, When Anna and I started this Rotary journey with you in July, we could not have fully imagined the beautiful and inspiring experiences that we have been sharing with you. This Rotary year is already, but only, half-way through. Rotarians in District 9214 have had a very busy year. We all are impressed with the wide range of community activities, the very many projects visited during my official tours and a huge number of volunteer hours that we have donated to support our communities. Thank you, our Visionary team leaders and your members.

We have visited almost 90% of our clubs and there is something quite different about each Club. I highlight some of the differences in my weekly messages so that you can all get a taste of what other Clubs are doing whether it is attracting new members, giving to the Rotary foundation, renewing aspects of a Club, working with our Rotaractors, or carrying out innovative projects that make a significant impact.

Traditionally, December was celebrated as the Family of Rotary month but in today's calendar. December is a time to focus on Disease Prevention and Treatment. Last month, WHO Director-General Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebrevesus and Rotary International President Iennifer Iones discussed the work the two organizations have done together for decades to eradicate polio and how we will continue to work together on a healthier future for mothers and children.

While Rotary's largest international initiative is

to eradicate polio, there are many more projects in local communities that help define disease treatments. This month, I'd like to challenge you to think imaginatively about how we might do more to support this area of focus. I welcome on board the intervention by the Ministry of Health in Uganda by providing to all local governments a cool UGX 23bn for the door-to-door polio vaccination where Rotary clubs have been invited to participate. The good news is that there is a need in every area where our clubs meet. Consider the numerous initiatives in these areas and do something in the community surrounding your club's fellowship location.

Throughout my official visits to clubs, I have discussed with the Presidents and Boards of the clubs the value of monthly reporting and the importance of sharing these reports with every club member. We are already in the sixth month of this visionary year. I will be delighted if every club prepares and shares the semiannual progress report.

January 2023 should bring new energy, and your first six-month report (July – December) should serve as a motivator for members to do their best in the final leg of our tour of

duty.

I'd also want to join the DICSON organizing team in starting the countdown to the early bird registration deadline for the 98th District conference and assembly. Join the countdown by making your complete payment by December 31st. Commemorate the start of 2023 as a fully registered delegate and be prepared to celebrate our communities.

Finally, this month, many of us will celebrate the holidays with our immediate and extended families. Let us not forget to take a moment to cherish those in our clubs and community who have no family or who recently lost family or who will be in dire need this holiday. The Rotary Foundation Mission is to help Rotarians advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty.

The seven areas of focus.

- 1. Water, sanitation and hygiene.
- 2. Basic education and literacy.
- 3. Disease prevention and treatment.
- 4. Maternal and child health.
- 5. Conserving the environment.
- 6. Peace building and conflict prevention.
- 7. Community economic development.

She DEFINED VIRAL DISEASES as diseases which sometimes don't have treatment. Here they just manage the symptoms

Examples of virus

- *Ebola
- * Covid-19 and others

She said there is no medicine that treats the above, the only medicine is early detection and strength of your nutrition.

EBOLA SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

- * Sudden onset of the liver.
- * Headache
- *Muscle pain
- * Vomiting
- * Chest pain
- * Running stomach among others

TREATMENT OF EBOLA

- * Lowering the fever
- * Reducing the fever
- * Providing good nutrition
- * Rehydration
- *Infection control
- * And any other supportive Treatment

HER TAKE HOME MESSAGES

1. Uganda has the capacity for vaccine discovery research including for covid19-100% funded by the Government.

The Government has done very well to invest in scientific solutions that will give a return on investment in the medium to long term.

3. This know is very important in developing new vaccine for deadly diseases like EBOLAin Uganda

She CONCLUDED by saying that a lot has been said but a lot of progress has been registered.

Insights from Rev Fr Deogratius Kiibi's talk.

The following were the shared parenting tips.

- * Mind what you say or do before your children, because they are learning everything from you
- * Avoid showing too much love, put boundaries and limit on their freedom at home
- * Be involved in your children's life, fix and give them time to discover how they are gifted.
- * Always adopt in your parenting style to fit your children.
- * Ensure your children are progressing.
- * Establish family rules and regulations and set limits
- * Be firm but fair. Do daily monitoring.
- * Train your children to be independent and confident.
- * Teach them how to live with others because they need other people in their life to succeed.
- * Be consistent from the start
- * Avoid harsh punishments, don't be verbally abusive and learn to control your anger in front of your children

* Treat your children with respect and don't blame them in public especially those in adolescent stages.

He concluded by saying," PARENTS have a hand in what you their children become in future, and always stop giving excuses because every excuse becomes a regret later.
