Five of the Interactors will attend a camp at Wee Jasper during the April school holidays, where they will undertake training leading to the award of a Certificate II in Active Volunteering.



ROTARY SUPPORTING YOUTH IN TIMOR LESTE

Trek-4-Timor

District Governor Monica was present to welcome the **Trek-4-Timor walkers Libby Bleakley (RC of Blackheath)** and **Teresa Beck (RC of Aurora Gungahlin)**, when, on Saturday, 12 March, they completed their 10 day, 357 kilometre walk from Martin Place in Sydney to Parliament House in Canberra.

Aurora Gungahlin hosted an Afternoon Tea on the Grounds opposite Parliament House to welcome the "Trekkers" and their support team, as they finished 10 days of walking. Representatives from the AFP, Timor Leste Embassy, work mates and family were also present.

Apart from rain on the penultimate day of the Trek, the trekkers and their support team had enjoyed good weather. The first day proved to be difficult, with temperatures in the high 30's, and walking along pavements from Martin Place to Liverpool resulted in severe blistering of the feet for Teresa. However she soldiered on and completed the Trek, albeit with the aid of an ice bucket on arrival.

Libby and Teresa are extremely grateful for the support provided by members of the Clubs whose towns they passed through. The President of the RC of Goulburn Argyle and his wife walked 12 kilometres with the trekkers from one side of town to the other. DG Nominee Mark Wallace (RC of Bowral/Mittagong) met the ladies at Colo Vale and home hosted dinner.

The Trek was successful with in excess of \$31,000 being raised towards the RAWCS Project – "Learning Centre for Youth" in Dili.


Is your Club supporting an outbound exchange student?

D9710 Emergency Fund helps rebuild a remote school in Nepal - from Pauline Gleeson, President of The Asha Foundation

Following the devastating earthquakes in Nepal last April and May, D9710 Emergency Fund donated \$10,000 towards The Asha Foundation's Nepal Earthquake Appeal. By July 2015 that appeal had reach an amazing \$90,000, thanks to the support of D9710, Rotary Clubs within the District, primary & high schools and the general public.



The Shree Bachhala Primary School in the village of Bhadratar 60 kilometres north of Kathmandu, was severely damaged by the earthquake and was demolished by the Nepali army within weeks of the second earthquake. Makeshift classrooms were constructed from tin and tarpaulins and the students attended their lessons (at right), uncomplaining during the relentless monsoon period followed by the harsh Himalayan winter.





Construction of the new classrooms was hampered due to monsoon rains, landslides, fuel shortages and political turmoil.

Following the end of the monsoon in October, the villagers cleared the road to the school by hand (at left), allowing trucks from Kathmandu laden with building material to make the five hour journey to the village.

Construction commenced on 25 November (at right), and the new classrooms and toilet block were officially opened by The Asha Foundation President Pauline Gleeson on 19 February 2016.

The total expenditure for this rebuild project, including earthquake relief for the villagers by way of tarpaulins and food, was A\$23,637.57, an amazingly low figure for such a wonderful outcome. The Asha Foundation prides itself on strict budgeting and total transparency.



The Asha Foundation will be funding the rebuild of a further two remote schools and we are presently in negotiations to rebuild a third school should the budget allow.

The Asha Foundation, along with our staff in Nepal, the Principal, teachers and of course the students of Shree Bachhala Primary School, Bhadratar, would like to thank DG Monica Garrett, PDG Rowley Tompsett, everyone associated with D9710 Emergency Fund and the Rotary Clubs within the District who helped make the rebuild of this school possible.

Canberra South's Vocational Visit to Snowyhydro SouthCare Emergency Helicopter Base

DG Monica, AG Brian and ROMAC's Sandra joined the Rotary Club of Canberra South for their vocational visit to the Snowyhydro SouthCare emergency helicopter base on 24 February. The club had a quick meal at Canberra South's normal venue at the Capital Golf Club, then adjourned to the SouthCare base in Hume.



At the SouthCare base, the Rotarians and visitors were given a 20 minute presentation on the services provided by the Snowyhydro SouthCare and some of the history of its operation. SouthCare serves 21 local government areas covering an area from Hay in the west, the Victorian border to the south, Orange to the north and the coast between the Victorian border and Ulladulla to the east. Most of this area can be reached within 60 minutes flying time from the base. Experience has shown that in medical emergency trauma, victims have a much higher likelihood of survival if they receive medical treatment and stabilisation during this 'golden hour'.

During 2014-15 they flew 509 missions with the crew on each mission comprising the pilot, an aircrew person, a doctor and a paramedic. Crews are available at the base 24/7, ready to be deployed - they are airborne within 10 to 15 minutes from the time the call is received. During this time the aircraft (helicopter) has to be fuelled with the appropriate amount of fuel, depending on the type and distance of the mission, and loaded with the appropriate medical and rescue

equipment. Total annual operating cost is about \$7 million, and the operating cost is about \$6,000 per hour

SouthCare performs three types of missions:

- Primary where the crew attends an accident
- Secondary where patients are transferred for more specialised treatment than can be provided in regional hospitals
- Non-medical usually search and rescue or bushfire assistance.

The service is only partially government funded, and it relies on corporate and community support. Rotary is a supporter of the Southcare Service - can you spot the Rotary wheel on the helicopter above?

Regional winner in 2016 Commonwealth Youth Awards for Excellence in Development Work

Batemans Bay Rotary Recognised in Manila – a press release to be proud of!

The 2016 Presidential Conference on WASH (Water and Sanitation Hygiene), hosted by **RI President KR Ravindran** and **TRF Chair Ray Klingingsmith**, has just completed its deliberations in Manila, Philippines.

Fifty water projects, from across most of Asia, were included in the competition that was held in conjunction with the symposium. The competition judges were headed by the chief of the World Bank, Moto Konichi, and the head of Unicef, Louise Maule, and their panel selected the best twelve of the fifty projects. Third in the twelve was the 2015-2016 water drilling program by **Batemans Bay Rotary and its twin, Intramuros Rotary, Manila**.



Every year since 2004, the two clubs have drilled water wells for schools and villages, and a large hospital, under a program entitled "Handog poso ng Rotary", meaning "A gift of water from Rotary". Some awards have been given to the two clubs over the years, but this latest is significant because the competition was fierce.

The Manila basin, a very large area, has a shallow water table and many creeks and rivers. The water is so heavily contaminated that the incidence of deaths among children

from water-borne disease is very high. In the areas where the two Rotary Clubs have provided water, the death rate among children from water-borne disease has plummeted to acceptable levels.
