Rotarians For Bees

Tonight we had an interesting talk on bees from John McCaskill supported by Shane Burette, and Ian and Fay Kirkwood who are members of the Rotary Group for Bees, who have a passion for bees and supporting the conditions in the environment to make them bee friendly.

John MCCaskill started the journey towards creating a

specialty group for bees after discussions with family and friends made him realise many people shared his concern about the world we will leave future generations. There has been a huge decline in bees around the world due to use of pesticides but they play a key role in agriculture. Since staring the Rotarians for Bee Group in Victoria the group has been exceptionally busy and has a lot of interest. John is looking to build a bigger network into other states with the help of Rotarians who share the interest.

We have 2 of own own members Geoff and Dieter who have their own hives. A video of the activities in the rural community of Hall was shown where a lot of enthusiasm has been generated to make the town more bee friendly. Planting flowering species, providing water where bees can land to drink, making boxes for native bees to use to store honey are examples of projects undertaken.

Schools have been really interested in the bee project and it provides a great way to Rotary to connect with them.

In areas affected by natural disasters eg Bushfires the regeneration of the area using suitable plants is another great way to help bees recover. Mention was made of ESRAG Environmental Stability Rotary Action Group.

You can join this group for \$30 US per year and it has a lot of information about projects related to environmental issues. The suggestion was made that you can often get all the the things you need to start a project by looking at what other groups have done. www. ESRAG.org

Fay also talked about the problem of the Varroa Mite. It has not got into Australia yet but has devastating affect on bee populations overseas. Hives are monitored electronically to detect for its presence on bees and bee keepers are recommended to check their hives 3 times year. During COVID bees were still transported to orchards to assist in pollination. Fay suggests don't be scared of bees, they do not attack unless threatened. Encourage your connections to avoid using pesticides outside.

COMBINED DISTRICT MEETING UPDATE

A well-attended zoom meeting regarding the constitution and bylaws for our new District 9660 (a merger between Districts 9670 and 9650) was held on Thursday night. Some 94 participants received an update from the transitional team. Nelson Bay Rotary Club was represented by Club Secretary Chris, as other Directors were attending our regular Club meeting with a guest speaker. Chris has prepared a brief report on the meeting and if any members would like more information please contact Chris, in the first instance.

The meeting was question and answer session led by Maurice Stack (9650) and Patrick Healey (9670). Several clubs in both Districts had submitted suggestions and changes to both the proposed constitution and bylaws and questions were answered in an easy to understandable way. There was some concern regarding the way the District Board (Committee) were elected, however the general feeling was that this was being handled in a democratic way. Discussions on the distribution of surplus funds and what the District Reserve fund should be was also discussed. An amended version of both the constitution and bylaws will be prepared and sent out soon.

It was announced at the meeting that Patrick Healey would be chair of District 9660 finance committee. Patrick has played a significant role in the operation of District 9670 and the on the joint Steering Committee. The final question of the evening was an interesting one. Rotary International are considering further changes to how Rotary operates in Australia, looking at running a pilot scheme for 4 years. This has to be approved in May 2022 and will not affect the merger of the 2 Districts on July 1 2022. As stated earlier the above is a condensed report of notes taken on the evening.
