Guest speaker Warwick Mathews



Warwick was our impromptu Guest speaker tonight. As very often our very own members have amazing stories to tell and make excellent guest speakers. Warwick with his "This is My Life" did not disappoint. Warwick was born on the 9th Nov. 1949 in Paddington Women's Hospital and spent his early years in Chester Hill (Syd). After his schooling his dad and uncle with contacts in the navy managed to get an apprenticeship for him at the Garden Is. Dockyard Navy base.

His first job was a model ship builder in the model shop followed by doing timber works on various prominent navy vessels in the boatshed. Union problems and demarcation disputes by the 40 unions were the order of the day in those times. His job on top the big hammerhead crane was to replace the hardwood the crane cables ran on, no harness or safety gear was needed in those days. His next job was as shipwright on board a BHP coastal freighter out of Port Kembla over-seeing balance of loading to keep ship trim.

As keen motor bike rider and occasional race participant he still has a win cheque of \$2.00 he won in a race in 1972.

One evening after a few beers a dare bet resulted in his one and only parachuting experience.

His taste of long-distance bike riding started back then when he rode to Adel. to see a friend that wasn't home, and he returned riding another 18h back home non-stop. This is still one of his favourite pastimes with his "postie bike" variety charity run.

His love for bikes makes him restore old bikes of which he has a few in the shed. After he purchased a HQ panel-van and met his future wife Christine, after a few courting years they got married in 1974 and purchased land in Toongabbie and built (moved) their first house this followed a few years by Nelson Bay, their favourite holiday destination, together with his son Ian and daughter Kylie His father never knew who his legitimate father was, after a DNA test and some "Ancestry" research he amazingly discovered that his grandfather (H.Rigby) was a plumber in Nelson Bay and is buried right here in the Nelson Bay cemetery. His ancestry research traces the Rigbys back to 1474.

Phil's 3 min talk was about a tort (*not the sweet variety*)

A tort is a civil wrong that causes a claimant to suffer loss or harm, resulting in legal liability for the person who commits the tortious act. The word 'tort' was first used in a legal context in the 1580s and in 1868 the rule in Rylands v Fletcher the House of Lords established a new area of English tort law. In this case Fletcher built a dam over a disused mine shaft which subsequently flooded and damaged his property and was awarded damages. The Donoghue v Stevenson was another landmark court decision in English tort law it laid the foundation of the modern law of negligence, establishing general principles of the duty of care.
