Shane worked at Roger Fletcher's Abbatoirs, a significant local company specialising in the preparation of fat lambs mainly for the export market. Melody worked for the Commonwealth Bank.

In 2010 they took the opportunity to relocate to Port Stephens and took over the TWW franchise a part of the Westfarmers group. Their key focus is 'old fashioned' country style customer service. For the last two years they have been proud sponsors of the Nelson Bay Gropers Rugby Union Club. They also sponsor Ten Pin bowling League and other sporting teams.

Initially operating as a two person family company, Shane and Melody have expanded their business to currently employ 11 people with a branch now open at Kotara and plans for future expansion to Maitland.

The company has been nominated in the Port Stephens Business Awards for the past 8 years with wins in their category during 3 of those years. The company is environmentally friendly and work boot recycling is one of their major initiatives. Each year thousands of work boots are saved from landfill by collection and sending to a Melbourne plant to be shredded and reborn as children's playground base.

Shane and Melody provide support to a wide range of community organisations including sporting groups, koala hospital and clubs such as ours. TWW in addition to sponsoring our club shirts also support our golf day and other Rotary projects.

Shane and Melody have an interest in fishing and spending time with their children and grand children. Shane is an avid Canterbury Bulldogs supporter.

A number of the surnames of the original pupils can still be found in the names of the children attending the school today and while some surnames change through marriage, the names are still represented 100 years on – including Cromarty, Upton, Anderson, and a few years later Holliday, Blanch, Thompson and Maslen.

Two of the school's earliest students who started at the school together (some 90 odd years ago), Ida Collard (nee Upton) and Eric Holliday both were awarded OAM medals in their later years. Ida (now 98 years) helped the principal, Megan Elliott, cut the cake during the evening's proceedings.
