This week we were privileged to hear from local GP Ana Pickering. Ana grew up in Newcastle but has spent much of her working life living and working in Nepal. Along with her husband (an anaesthesiologist) she has spent around 8 years (on and off) during the last twelve years treating the people of Nepal at the United Mission Hospital in Tansen.

Although established by Christian missionaries 60 years ago the hospital today is staffed mainly by Hindus.

The hospital has accreditation to give practical training to doctors once they have completed their studies at Nepalise Universities.

Nepal is a tiny country geographically split between three levels. The highest level includes Mt Everest, the middle level is somewhat lower but still very mountainous and the lower level which is flat and supports agriculture. Tansen is in the middle level.

For the Nepalis electricity supply is limited - as is water. They live a hard life and although often portrayed as "poor but happy" the smiles belie the hard lives they live. The majority are Hindu and their food consists mainly of vegetables. 80% live in rural areas and 50% do not have electricity. Water must be boiled or filtered.

Despite this most people have mobile phones!

The ratio of doctors to population is 70 per 100,000. This compares to 390 per 100,000 in Australia.

More than a passion and enthusiasm Ana showed a love for work and in thanking Ana for her presentation Don Whatham observed that she truly exhibits the Rotary Ideal of Service above Self.


Covid and other food handling procedures.

Kiva is an international non-profit founded in San Francisco in 2005 with a mission to expand financial access to help underserved communities (where access to banks is limited or non- existent) thrive.

This is done by crowdfunding loans and unlocking capital for the underserved, improving the quality and cost of financial services, and addressing the underlying barriers to financial access around the world. Through Kiva's work, students can pay for tuition, women can start businesses, farmers are able to invest in equipment and families can afford needed emergency care. Once re-paid the lender can choose to re-lend or retain monies. Defaults are low, with approx 97% of loans re-paid. Nelson Bay Rotary Club currently supports kiva loans
