RHYS WESTBURY – THE CASE FOR NO WIND FARMS



Tonight's speaker Rhys Westbury moved from Tamworth with his parents at 3 years of age and now resides in Boat Harbour. Rhys was educated locally and is currently employed as an actor and in the tourism industry. He has recently taken a leadership role in local opposition to the proposed offshore wind farm involving hundreds of wind turbines over 1800sq km just 20 km off the coastline between Port Stephens and Swansea.

Rhys expressed concerns about the environmental impact of such a project. He and others are seriously worried about the negative impacts of the windfarm. These include the visual impact of 100's of turbines up to 250m tall just 20km away from the coastline. He has concern for the impact this will have on the \$699M tourism industry, the effect on the 40,000 whales who pass the area on their annual migration, the effect on porpoises and seals and the fishing industry. Rhys expressed concern that wind turbines would negatively impact seabirds many of which breed on the coastal islands (Cabbage Tree and Broughton) off Port Stephens. Most significant are the Wedge-tailed shearwater, the threatened Gould's Petrel and the Short-tailed shearwater.

Wind turbines generate large volumes of underwater noise. There is considerable noise and vibration generated by the rotating blades. Pile driving and other noise generated during the construction phase will have a negative impact on the breeding of juvenile fish species.

Newcastle is one of Australia's busiest ports with many cargo ships already traversing the waters off the Port Stephens coastline. Concern is held that this new industry will add to the stress already present in this busy corridor.

There is a belief that more research on the renewable energy industry is necessary. The impact of renewables on our pristine environment, wildlife and the potential impact to our local economy must be balanced.

In thanking Rhys for his presentation, Richard Turner congratulated Rhys for his public spirit and the non-emotive and non-political presentation of the risks as he saw them.
