## **Senior Constable Tim Smith**



Tim a police officer attached to the youth and crime prevention command is youth officer at Nelson Bay PCYC. Tim spent 19 years on general duties in Sydney prior to gaining youth worker qualifications enabling him to work with kids to reduce crime through case management and engaging kids in programs.

The Police and Citizens Youth Club program was established in 1937 when then Police Commissioner Bill McKay had the vision of "creating a place where lads, brought up in industrial areas can meet and play and engage in sports and gave them a chance in life. Preventing them from becoming street loafers."

That is basically still the goal of PCYC today although girls are now included and activities have become more structured.

Commissioner McKay partnered with Rotary and together they established the first PCYC in Woolomoloo. Rotary Nelson Bay was instrumental in establishing the PCYC in Nelson Bay.

We now have 64 clubs in NSW each with 1 or 2 Police as youth case managers and a civilian manager who runs the day to day activities of the club.

Tim as a case manager plans and manages programs for young offenders and youth at risk. The suite of programs aims to reduce crime and redirect young offenders. Programs need to consider the young persons background and factors include prior offending, living circumstances, education/employment, peer relations, substance abuse, leisure recreation, personality/behaviour and attitudes/beliefs. Goals are set and achievement managed and monitored. Schools and family play a vital role in the process.

Current Police Commissioner Mick Fuller has developed a suite of programs which are being implemented by PCYC's throughout the state. The strategy known as Riseup targets disengaged young people directing them towards workplace opportunities. The Youth Crime Prevention Command of NSW Police aims to work in collaboration with PCYC's to support young people in building independence and resilience.

Programs within Commisioner Fuller's Riseup strategy are titled Fitforchange, Fitforhome, Fittogether, Fittostrive, Fittolearn and Fitforservice.

Our club has and will continue to support the wonderful work of PCYC in our community. Our members are thankful of the dedicated, efficient and effective support of young people by Tim Smith and his co-workers a PCYC.

## FROM LAST WEEK.



Last week we had the pleasure of welcoming visiting Rotarian Shelia Wainwright from the Rotary Club of Wakefield in England. Shelia provided a very interesting short address about a project she had introduced to her club. Seven years ago her husband John a staunch Rotarian died with early onset dementia. Shelia cared for John in the seven years prior to his death. During this time John's dementia caused him to become increasingly violent. Shelia was provided welcome assistance by an Admiral Nurse (Funded by charitable donations to Dementia UK).

After John's death Shelia with the assistance of her Wakefield Rotary Club raised \$220,000 to help fund the Admiral Nurse Program. During her attendance at a dementia conference she came across a table of robotic cats. These cats miaow, roll over, purr, lick their paws and bring a smile. They do everything a cat does except use a kitty litter tray. They are life size and very lifelike powered by replaceable batteries.

Shelia recalled a time when John was having a violent spell that their small pet cat jumped on his knee. John's violent

spell eased and he began to pat the cat. The cat appeared to bring him peace and calm.

An idea was hatched and Shelia embarked on a new project, the provision of robotic cats for people with dementia. As an Ambassador for Rotarians Easing Problems of Dementia (REPoD) she began a project encouraging every Rotary Club to raise enough money to provide a robotic cat to a person with dementia.

Shelia presented our club with a robotic cat which we immediately put to great use. Guest speaker Lia Pereria was given our cat to present to her mother (an early onset dementia sufferer) whom she was visiting at the weekend. Lia will provide a replacement cat to our club as soon as she is able to purchase one from the Brisbane distributor.

Rotarians are truly wonderful people!!!
