# **COSTS vs PROFITS**

To complete the recent financial reports from President Kathy and Treasurer Ian, where our income and donations for the first 4 months of the year were outlined. The other side of the financial equation of Rotary service activities are now presented. Our procurement team for supplies lead by VP John, Chris B, Tony T and Doug B and others, spend many hours behind the scenes reviewing our cost structures and service delivery. We are able to keep our overall costs between 30 to 35 %, ensuring our profit ratio of 65 to 70% is maintained. Our strong financial position enables us to buy in bulk, get quality products at the right price, coupled with our excellent storage facilities at the 'shed", means we can maintain our costs. This means that we can distribute the donations we typically give each year, usually in excess of \$30,000. The procurement team review stock holdings regularly and upcoming events and keep an eye out for bargains at the various supermarket chains, purchasing in bulk if needed.

A large number of community groups with limited buying power and storage facilities do not receive anywhere the profit margins we do, most struggling to get within 50% of costs vs profits.

The team also reviews equipment and if beneficial changes are necessary, we will apply for various Community grants to cover the costs of any purchases, which ensures our Service Account remains in a strong position. As a Club we have a fantastic reputation for providing quality professional delivery of our services, not just in catering, but the many other community activities we engage in. If members have suggestions regarding this aspect of the Club's operations, all will be considered by the procurement team and then of course by the Board. As a Club we are in good shape.

Background We have had a long association with Bunnings. In the last 12 months through the hard work of Tony we have strengthened the relationship to a point where will earn between \$10,00 to \$12,000 net per annum. Bunnings have also provided the Club additional donations, including enough stock of sausages left over from the family night events, that we were able to use to feed the golfers and volunteers at our Charity Golf Day, several hundred cans of drink and of course their very generous donation of plants and trees for Anna Bay School.


