"ONIONGATE" AND YOUR ROTARY INSURANCE

This week's storm in a sandwich created much comment nationally when Bunnings announced that onions must be placed on the bottom of a sausage sandwich. Our Community Service Director, Chris B fielded a number of enquiries from members regarding their risk of being personally sued and some good natured emails as well. First the 'onions", It appears that Bunnings "recommended" not mandated that the onions be placed on the bottom. As we use two slices of bread as instructed by Bunnings Taylors Beach we can always ensure the onions are on the bottom, by simply turning the sandwich over. Problem solved.

Now the Insurance issue. Chris contacted the District Insurance Officer to confirm our coverage as Rotarians. As stated on Thursday night Rotary Australia has one of the best Volunteer Insurance policies in the country. The bottom line is we can't be personally sued at Bunnings or any other authorised Rotary event, unless gross negligence is identified. Rotarians are also covered going to and from any Rotary sanctioned event including our Thursday night meetings. Insurance costs are one of the major expense items of the District 9670 budget. However in light of "oniongate" and discussing the matter with other Directors, to ensure good safety practices and have all the "boxes ticked" for any occurence we will asking all members to sign on and off their shifts at all Community events.

We have already commenced this practice at our working bees on Gan Gan Lookout, and those attending the Science and Engineering Challenge know this is usual practice

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DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SPEAKER NOVEMBER 29.

Researchers have developed a mobile phone application named Bernie to support defendants issued with Apprehended Domestic Violence Orders (ADVOs) to strengthen their positive decision-making around behaviours and emotions.

Approximately 15 per cent of people charged with a domestic violence assault reoffend

within 12 months. Of those who reoffend, almost half do so before the court process has

been finalised.

It is hoped the user-friendly app, developed by psychology and law researchers at the University of Newcastle (UON) and Australian National University (ANU), will be a successful early-intervention tool to support better outcomes.

Drought appeal update

District Governor Brian Coffey announced at the recent Presidents and Chairs meeting an update on the recent Drought Appeal conducted by Channel 9. The Distribution of the \$10 million raised was handled by Federated Farmers. Our District received \$250,000 plus and additional \$36,000 raised in the District through a RAWCS appeal. A small team appointed by DG Brian, led by DGN Graham Hooper and Secretary Nicole Shanks from Dubbo and the Western Asst Governors reviewed many, many applications and the have distributed the funds through drought affected areas in our District. The drought is not over and more will need to be done in 2019.
