Ella Clarke on 3 weeks in India



Ella had 3 weeks travelling in India and really enjoyed the experience despite the confronting scenes that greet you there. Ella was able to visit many splendid temples on the trip, but surveyed streets in which the houses were so rundown, it looked as if an earthquake had just hit them. Despite the condition of the houses, people lived amongst it, pitching tarpaulins with poles, and making patchwork repairs to keep things going.

In terms of loading vehicles, certain standards that we might assume would apply

universally, don't apply in India. The loads were piled so high they were just below where they might fall or break.

New Buildings were scaffolded with bamboo sticks, while the workers hung off at alarming heights.

Despite the poverty everyone had a mobile phone. Companies supply them to everyone over 18, but the user must pay for service. Indians love a good festival it would seem, with many events over the time Ella was there, but sometimes even the guides were not sure what the celebration was about.

Ella travelled to Varanasi on the banks of the holy Ganges River.

Here she saw the practice in which bodies were cremated on funeral pyres and then the ashes spread into the sacred river. Bodies in some cases were openly displayed.

Cows and dogs were present in large numbers in India but most looked underweight. It was recommended not to pat the dogs because of the potential they carry rabies. Elephants and camels were also present but generally were owned by wealthier folk who could afford to feed them. An elephant will eat between 53 and 56 kgs of sugar cane per day. Woman are gaining more status in India but around 80 % of marriages are still arranged marriages. Ella also saw a massive kitchen which feeds the local population and serves 100,000 meals per day for free.

Ella says she would like to go back to experience more of this country's incredible contrasts. She and her travel companion Dawn were both interested in textiles but found the factory tours were also combined with a fair bit of salesmanship.
