WENDY STEIN OAM – SPACIM PIKININI.

Our club was honoured to hear and see a wonderful presentation by an outstanding Rotarian Wendy Stein from the Rotary Club of Salamander Bay. Wendy has devoted most of the past 20 years of her life helping to improve the life opportunities of those from our closest neighbour Papua New Guinea.

Wendy's service to the people of PNG began in 2005 when she visited Mando Village in the Eastern Highlands. She organised volunteers to provide school buildings and facilities to remote communities. She also managed and worked with volunteer groups of Rotarians to provide access to drinking water for residents of these remote villages. She quickly saw the need to make a change to the conditions women and girls were facing in PNG. In 2015 Wendy and husband Brian set up Spacim Pikinini with the goal of establishing health and hygiene facilities for women and young girls in remote areas of PNG. When a small boat used to deliver supplies sank whilst delivering medical supplies, Wendy took possession of an old rundown boat located in Australia. After restoration, the partial wreck was renamed Kula Spirit and Wendy and Brian sailed it from Nelson Bay to PNG.

Kula Spirit is registered as a medical clinic and provides medical services in remote rural communities. In addition to primary health care, eye care testing and provision of glasses as well as the provision of disability services is undertaken. Training of local health care workers is also an important aspect of Wendy's work with over 400 health care workers receiving training. Family planning and counselling prevent unintended pregnancies and maternal deaths. Contraceptive implants placed in the arm providing 5 years contraception have allowed many young women to pursue employment and better quality of life. The project provides underwear, sanitary products and Rotary birthing packs, all materials necessary, for a happy healthy lifestyle and clean safe childbirth.

Kula Spirit is currently berthed in Port Moresby and Wendy's project is experiencing a lack of funding due to COVID-19. To compensate the shortfall Wendy is promoting sales of the book Rona Stole our Relief.

Wendy is a truly remarkable Rotarian and the most deserving recipient of an Order of Australia medal and being named Rotarian of the Year 2018-19 for Rotary Zone 8 which includes Australia and New Zealand.


GOLF DAY MEETING REPORT.

Kula Spirit is a solid 44' fishing trawler owned by Australian Wendy Stein. She is setting up an outreach floating clinic to visit remote villages without access to adequate medical services.

Wendy started off in this area with a project called Spacim Pikinini – literally "spread out your children" – which provides subcutaneous contraceptive implants for women in remote areas. Spacim Pikinini is a charity and Wendy's focus has been on teaching nurses, medical students and young doctors to insert the implants. Under her supervision some 60,000 of these devices have now been used in PNG. They are Jadelle double implants, which ensure contraception for almost 5 years, and fertility returns promptly when the inserts are removed. Her project, which is staffed by volunteers, has the support of the PNG government, the O&G department at UPNG, Rotary International and the Australian-based DAK Foundation.

But Spacim Pikinini now does much more than that. Dedicated, tireless and enthusiastic, Wendy has expanded its activities and she now enables free provision of disability support services, new medical equipment to clinics and hospitals, hearing aids and spectacles for all those in need. Indeed this week her son was held up by PNG customs on arrival here and had a merry time explaining away the 500 pairs of reading glasses in his kit bag!
