Gerard & Marianne (guests of Henk & Agnes Tobbe) are from Amersfoort.

Amersfoort is a city in the central Netherlands, located in the province of Utrecht. The history of Amersfoort dates back to the Roman era when it was a military fortress known as "Amoria".

During the Middle Ages, Amersfoort grew into a market town and became an important trading centre. In the 14th century, the city fortifications were expanded, and the city became one of the most important cities in the Netherlands. In the 16th and 17th centuries, Amersfoort was an important centre of the Dutch Reformation, and many churches and monasteries were built in the city. During this time, the city was also a centre of the textile industry. In the 19th and 20th centuries, Amersfoort continued to grow and industrialize, becoming a modern city with a thriving economy.

He was a man of regular habits he always arrived home each day at a certain time.
