Scott Johnston Eastern Division Director Toastmasters International

In 2019 Toastmasters International and Rotary International commenced a strategic partnership with RI recognising the importance of effective communication in promoting the ideals of Rotary.

Scott told us that people join Toastmasters for many reasons:

to improve their confidence; to improve their communication skills; to overcome their fear of speaking in public; to pick up tips for an event where they have to speak.

Toastmasters gives members the guidance to improve their skills in a friendly, nurturing environment.

Members are allocated jobs for the evening – chair, sergeant-at-arms, toastmaster, grammarian, table topics master, speakers, speech evaluators, general evaluator.

A meeting usually commences with a call to order, followed by a business session where members learn the correct procedure for moving motions (minutes, reports etc).

At early meetings a new member might be asked to propose a toast (on a topic of their own choosing and can be serious or flippant). In their own time they would move to more challenging tasks. An early speech would be similar to our "Behind the Badge". Others might include humorous, serious, educational and sales pitches – all at own pace.

Members learn how to structure speeches, how to get points across, (e.g. the power of "the rule of three"), ways to remember important points, use of visual aids, dealing with nerves.

Competitions are held yearly within Clubs, Districts, Nationally and Internationally. There is no compulsion to compete.

Each aspect of a meeting is evaluated in a positive fashion with evaluators highlighting strengths and suggesting points for improvement. Even the evaluators are evaluated – Evaluated never critised!
