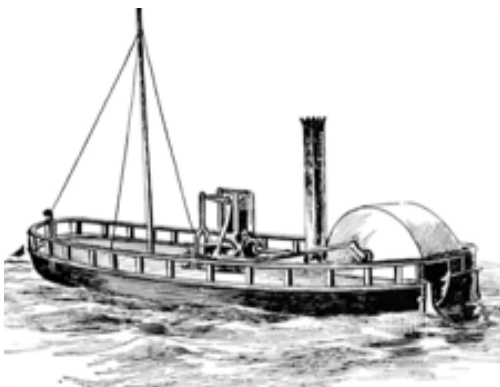

The previous arrangements have changed, but we are still fortunate to have a date each month, with some of the days potentially on busy days. We are seeking confirmation of these dates in writing(email).

A letter has been received from Sue Thompson the MERV coordinator, advising that an agreement has been reached with all proceeds from Bunnings BBQs on the 2nd weekend in August are to go to set up MERVs. (Mens Health Vans) As it turns out we are already booked for Saturday the 10th. Potentially Salamander Rotary could be involved this weekend as well.

Chris reported on the last Bunnings BBQ , which showed a lower result than some of our other recent days. In general this might reflect on generally less trade in these economically more difficult times.

Jim Booth's 3 minute talk

Jim did give a succinct talk tonight on the subject of bow thrusters.
