THE FORGOTTEN FLOTILLA

Dr Michael Bendon holds post-graduate qualifications in Archaeology, History, Maritime Archaeology, Education and Cultural Heritage.

He has worked for a great number of years as an archaeologist on numerous sites around the Mediterranean and Europe, including Israel, Portugal, Germany and Greece, with extended survey in Turkey, Syria and Jordan. Michael first started as a field archaeologist in Israel before moving briefly to Portugal, and then on to directing a Medieaval church and cemetery excavation in Northern Germany.



More recently, he has been assisting a colleague with investigations on Phalasarna, a large Classical/Hellenistic maritime city in Western Crete, as well as working on the excavation of the first Minoan shipwreck to be discovered. His most recent research has revolved around two British WWII wrecks located off shore from the ancient Phalasarna site.

This is not a story of the big ships or those with names, but rather of some smaller ships allocated only numbers. This is the tale of a group of "minor war vessels" and their crews that it seems history has overlooked, the *Forgotten Flotilla*.

The Tank Landing Craft, the TLC Mk1 ("A" lighter), at the time of its development, was a new type of craft. Their real, and often unexpected, battle capabilities had yet to be tested. A Sub-Lieutenant from the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (RNVR), or perhaps only a Royal Navy (RN) Boatswain, skippered these 'experimental' vessels into the struggle in the Middle East.

Without the TLCs' participation, a great number of Allied operations of World War Two would not have proved as successful. One such operation was *Demon*, the evacuation of British and ANZAC troops from mainland Greece in 1941.

Most exploits of the TLC Mk1s and their crews rated only a short and generally unspecific, mention in reports. At times though, designation numbers were included within a reference in the Admiralty documents or the War Diaries. This has enabled tracking of a certain vessel's involvement in a particular event. Although there are a number of gaps that cannot yet, and may never, be filled in for the vessels, their 'life history' is reconstructed here. **Continued Page 2** In this Bulletin: Pages 2, 3, 4, 5 -. 


Larry McGrath and Sgt Warwick do their thing at this night's meeting. Larry won the raffle, with luck on his side.
