KENHURST CONNECTION

Our guest speaker on Thursday night was Dennis von Someron from Kenhurst Rotary Club, pictured above with his wife Judy. The visit was organised by former Kenhurst Rotary member and Youth Director elect Lesley Freeman, who introduced Dennis. And interestingly enough, Lesley wnet to school with Dennis's wife and also Club Sgt's Warwick Mathieson wife, Christine. It's a small world out there and we trust Dennis and Judy enjoyed their time with us.

Our Guest Speaker on Thursday night was Kenthurst Rotarian Dennis von Someron who gave a very interesting talk on a program called Shine for Kids which he commenced 25 years ago. At 13 Dennis father was arrested for fraud and it changed his life forever. He then gave the members some startling statics on the prison system, highlighting that over 50 % of prisoners are women who are imprisoned for nonviolent crimes, mainly drug offences and theft, while over 70 % are aboriginal offenders. This obviously impacts on the lives of the families and particularly the children in those families and hence Shine for Kids was born.

Dennis gave the members some real examples of the impact on family life and suggested early intervention was a far better path to take rather the other alternative of imprisonment. He also suggested that rather than build new prisons, the Governments, both State and Federal would be better off funding the intervention programs. He is certainly passionate about Shine for Kids and the members of the Club wished thanked Dennis for his thought provoking talk

STAR AWARDS CONTINUED

The Rotary Humanitarian STAR Award recognises outstanding scientific and technological achievements that significantly improve lives and positively impacts humanity. The Third Annual Rotary Humanitarian STAR Awards will be held today at the University Club of Pasadena in California. Pablo is a University of Newcastle Professor at the School of Electrical Engineering and Computing. He is currently completing a book in the area of business and consumer analytics. LOCAL SCIENTIST WINS ROTARY STAR AWARD

A Newcastle-based computer scientist, Professor Pablo Moscato, is a nominee for the prestigious Rotary Humanitarian STAR (Science, Technology, Aerospace, Robotics) Award..ecognised in two different categories of Health and Medical and Knowledge Sharing, Pablo was nominated for his application and development of mathematical models and computer algorithms for some of the most challenging problems in biology and biotechnology research. The nomination for the Knowledge Sharing category is also based on the introduction of a technique called memetic algorithms. Pablo's published work on memetic algorithms has created a new field of mathematics that has gained worldwide reputation."I was awarded by Rotary International in 1987 a Scholarship to study overseas, and I went to the California Institute of Technology. There I started a field called memetic algorithms which now has its own dedicated scientific journal. Thirty years later, a nomination, again by Rotary International, is a great honour to my professional trajectory, one that started in Argentina, took me around the world, and then found its new mission in the Hunter for the past 16 years," Pablo said. Among his achievements, Pablo led the team that was the world's first in identifying a panel of proteins, allowing for a longitudinal test that predicts the onset of Alzheimer's several years in advance. He said this research has been well received in the Hunter."In the Hunter I have been pleased to receive support for my Alzheimer's Disease research by anonymous donors that contacted my institution wanting to know more about my research. I was also supported by the incredible people of the Maitland Cancer Appeal, a group with vision, one that helps me to try innovative techniques for the analysis of data on the performance of drugs. We are inventing new types of Artificial Intelligence methods to help us discover which mechanisms may explain the response of some cancer cells to particular drugs. "My research lab has hugely benefited by the collaboration of the Hunter community and I hope to continue developing a partnership with it to address some challenging problems in many fields."

Exactly 2 years ago I had just completed and sent out Bulletin 33 2017 when news came through that Bart had passed away, I was honoured to publish a special Bulletin 33a on behalf of the Editorial team. 2 years on Bart is still giving. Club members will recall that recently we received a bequest from Bart's Estate. Last Thursday we received further instructions as to where the money should go. On Saturday night at the District Conference, three of Bart's Rotary favourites, Australian **Rotary Health, Shelterbox and The Rotary** Foundation will be presented with funds, the bulk of it from Bart's bequest. District **Governor Brian and his Conference team** have allowed a change in the very tight schedule, due to the respect Bart had in our District. I have published a short extract from Bulletin 33a which is available on the Club website. Memories came flooding back when I read the Edition and reflected that Bart is still giving two years, on and for many years to come. Chris Bartlett this week's Editor for Bulletin 33 2019

Extract

Once in a lifetime you meet an extraordinary human being and yesterday, March 11 2017 we lost one of the best.

Past District Governor Bart Richardson OAM, Paul Harris Fellow passed away peacefully at Harbourside Haven, aged 97. "Young Bart" as he was affectionately known in his later years was loved by all those he came into contact with (and there are many) has left an indelible mark on us all. His life story is known to many of us, not only was he a Rotarian of 53 years with a PHF and 4 sapphire pins, he also served with Legacy for a staggering 63 years, was a member of the Masonic Lodge, an author at 94, and committed community volunteer right up till a few weeks ago, still helping others. In the coming days and weeks, Bart's loss, not only to his family, Rotary but the wider community will be deeply felt. Rest Easy Bart
