War and Peace in 40 Minutes

A special night with many guests to let our friends and neighbours learn about the Rotary Peace Fellowships. Judith Mitchell gave a brief introduction of the program funded by the Rotary Foundation - followed by contributions from various speakers that covered aspects of war and peace.

Each year, Rotary selects up to 100 individuals from around the world to receive fully funded academic fellowships at one of the Rotary peace centers. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.

In just over a decade, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 900 fellows for careers in peace building. Many of them go on to serve as leaders in national governments, NGOs, the military, law enforcement, and international organizations like the United Nations and World Bank.

Two types of peace fellowships are available.



Masters Degree:

Rotary offers master's degree fellowships at premier universities in fields related to peace and conflict prevention and resolution. Programs last 15 to 24 months and require a practical internship of two to three months during the academic break. Each year, we award up to 50 master's degree fellowships at these institutions:

Duke University and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, USA, International Christian University, Japan, University Bradford, England, University of Queensland, Australia. Uppsala University, Sweden.



Professional Development Certificate:

For experienced professionals working in peace-related fields who want to enhance their professional skills, Rotary offers a three-month program in peace and conflict prevention and resolution at Chulalongkorn University in Thailand. This program incorporates two to three weeks of field study. Up to 50 certificates each year are awarded.

Dr Sam Wills - who visited us some months ago - had a brief but very interesting talk about the relationship between hardship and conflicts: the poorer a country the greater the chances of civil war or a conflict with neighbouring countries. "If you got nothing to loose you might as well fight for something to gain".

Next speaker was Associate Professor Graham Brewer from Newcastle University who is at the helm of one of the world wide training centres of UNITAR (UN Institute for Training and Research) and specialises in areas such as disaster preparedness and reconstruction, sustainable development and urban resilience. 


Why this night?

Saturday Night - after a good meal - we were entertained by the band Supergroove" that brought young an old on the dance floor.




Sunday morning - after an "in memoriam" for the Rotary friends that

PEACE PROFILE: MARIA EFFENDI

Maria is a former peace fellow now working as an assistant professor in peace and conflict studies at National Defense University (NDU) in Islamabad: "I teach courses on conflict analysis, applied conflict resolution, conflict transformation, and peace-building in the master's program. NDU is the pioneer institution that introduced peace studies and conflict resolution as a discipline to Pakistan's education system in 2008, and I joined the NDU team in early 2009 to further establish the department and curriculum."
