### FIRE RESCUE IN NELSON BAY.

Guest speaker Deputy Captain Glen Blanch and fellow retained fireman Ben Freund gave us a comprehensive and informative overview of the history and current operation of fire and rescue from facilities operating the Salamander Bay Fire Station. Members were brought up to date with the latest in fire fighting strategies.



Local firefighters moved from the original fire station in Yacaaba Street Nelson Bay to the modern Salamander Bay station in 2014. The Station is staffed by permanent crew Monday to Friday 8am to 4.30pm and on call retained staff around the clock. Glen and Ben are two of the 21 retained fire staff who all have other primary employment. Glen is a paramedic and Ben a Port Stephens Council employee. Retained fire officers bring broad and local knowledge to the job. Mobile technology ensures immediate response and once at the station each situation is assessed to provide suitable equipment and manpower to the job. Two fully equipped vehicles can be instantly mobilised and a full range of backup equipment is available at neighbouring stations.

The modern fire station provides fire, rescue and HAZMAT facilities. In addition the PlusPlan includes prevention, education and pre incident planning. Support is also provided to other services for accident rescue, police, counter terrorism, flood rescue and medical response is under development.

Response to automatic fire alarms is a major responsibility with up to 130 calls per year. Many are false alarms, but safety is always the priority. Service is provided with home smoke alarms and advice given including home assessment and safety awareness. The presentation included demonstration in the correct use of a fire blanket.

# CENTENARY OF ROTARY IN AUSTRALIA CELEBRATION. RAFFLE

To celebrate 100 years of Rotary in Australia our club has planned and conducted several events to mark the occasion. All clubs Australia wide were invited to participate in the "End Trachoma" project. Past RI President Ian Risely proposed this project during his year as International President having observed closely the effect that trachoma has on the health and wellbeing of many people living in remote communities.

**Trachoma** is an infectious disease caused by bacterium Chlamydia trachomatis. The infection causes a roughening of the inner surface of the eyelids. This roughening can lead to pain in the eyes, breakdown of the outer surface or cornea of the eyes, and eventual blindness. Trachoma is the leading preventable cause of blindness worldwide. It is very contagious.

Trachoma almost always affects both eyes. Symptoms begin with mild itching and irritation of the eyes and eyelids. They may progress to blurred vision and eye pain.

Antibiotics treat early-stage trachoma. Surgery is required in later stages. Access to clean water and improved sanitation are key to prevention. The project includes supply of packages of hygiene products and educational programs to families living in remote areas of Australia.

Our club's Centenary Committee led by Helen Ryan conducted a raffle for a wheelbarrow of goods donated by local business houses. Tickets in the barrow of goods valued at \$2,700 were sold at several venues over a three week period. The raffle was drawn at our Centenary Lunch on Saturday by PDG Greg Bevan. The lucky winner was David Fisher a member of the Medowie Williamtown Club. Helen reported that proceeds of the raffle were approximately \$3900.

### TREE PLANTING

Our second project was the planting of 100 trees. The committee consulted Port Stephens Council to determine a suitable site. The boundary (north and south) of Tom O'Dwyer Oval adjacent to the PCYC was selected as an ideal location.

Club members under the supervision of PSC Environment officer, Elise Budden set about preparing the site. This involved the clearing of extensive thorny bracken, lantana and bitou bush. Geoff Diemar, David Clark and our Rotary teams all worked tirelessly over 3 days. Geoff arranged disposal of the

two large trailer loads of rubbish using his and David's packed trailers. Tip fees were waived thanks to honorary member Mayor Ryan Palmer. We must commend the work of community volunteer Mark McEvoy who worked with us in removal and loading the undergrowth.



One hundred suitable native trees were donated by the council and these will be planted on Wednesday 5 May by students from

Schools who eagerly accepted our invitation to be involved.
