### **RETRO ISSUE- FLASHBACK TO THE BAY 1965**





It was a big night for long serving Vice President John Stuhmcke, Not only did he run last night's meeting, He then gave the Club a great insight to Nelson Bay back in 1965 when he first moved to the area, he also won both Heads and Tails and Raffle, collected the fines to complete a very memorable night indeed. Our attendance was down with a large number of members away travelling or unable to attend. However great fellowship was enjoyed and an excellent meal provided by the Nelson Bay Bowling Club's new caterers was enjoyed by all. This was followed by an entertaining Sergeants session before John shared some of his recollections since moving to Nelson Bay in 1965.

John, a member of the RAAF was transferred to Williamtown and wife Yvonne was 7 months pregnant. There was no permanent accommodation for long term rental, and they were shown some units at the Illuka Flats where the Real Estate agent opened all the doors and windows and waited outside so the fleas and other bugs to leave. Both John and Yvonne's daughters were born in Nelson Bay at the old hospital which is now the Community Arts Centre. There were only two Doctors, Satori and Clark, and No dentist, the nearest being in Kotara in Newcastle. There was no main road into Soldiers Point, the only access being along Mambo Road. The RSL was not built until 1968. There was only one Grocer's shop in Cascade walk. A small Coles/ BiLo was the only supermarket.

- No Child Care Available
- Street lights went out at midnight until 1975

- You had to catch a ferry into Newcastle, They ran at half hour intervals weekdays and hourly weekened as no bridge at Stockton
- D'Albora's Marina was only a very long jetty with a T junction at the end. John recalled an associate of his Fishing for his son's bike after the son had riden off the end of the wharf
- The public school as located where the Community College is now located
- Only on Café in town- Darts Café. John related a humorous story about a fire at 2 am at Darts in 1970

### AUSTRALIAN ROTARY HEALTH UPDATE



Those members who attended PDG Helen Ryan's District Conference may remember Leanne Hobden, who attended Newcastle University. And was a guest presenter at one of the Breakfast meetings. Australian Rotary health recently the results of her FHD studies.

From 2015-2017, <u>Breanne Hobden</u> conducted research on depression management for individuals with comorbid alcohol dependence with an Ian Scott PhD Scholarship from Australian Rotary Health. "One in two people seeking substance abuse treatment report depressive symptoms indicating that regular screening and monitoring of these symptoms should be considered in this setting," Breanne said.

### During her PhD, Breanne found:

- In a general practice setting, approximately 1 in 15 people may be both depressed and be misusing alcohol, however, general practitioners only accurately identify 21% of these people.
- The rate of depressive symptoms is high in substance abuse treatment clinics, with 55% of patients in this setting screening positive for depression.
- Substance abuse clinicians are relatively aware of depression in their patients, being able to accurately identify 73% of those that report being depressed.
- Only seven studies have examined the best psychosocial treatment for co-occurring depression and alcohol misuse.
- The studies which have examined psychosocial treatment for co-occurring depression and alcohol misuse were generally poor quality and therefore stronger research is needed to inform clinical treatment.
