David told us that Rotary was started with the vision of one man Paul Harris in 1905 with a couple of professional mates with diverse backgrounds.

Rotarians designate a Paul Harris fellow to recognise a person whose life demonstrates a shared purpose with the objectives and mission of the Rotary Foundation.

This year's recipients are Adrienne and Paul H.

Adrienne was born in schooled in Auckland, went to University, met her husband Hugh where after getting married they spent two years in Broome in Western Australia . They then returned to farming life in Tikokino and raised 3 sons.. Unfortunately due to a farming accident in 2000 Hugh lost his life. As Hugh had been a member of the Ravendown Board Adrienne set up a scholarship known as the Hugh Williams Ravensdown Memorial Scholarship with \$5,000 being made available each year to an undergraduate for study costs.

Adrienne then moved into local authority politics and was a councillor for the Hawkes Bay Regional Council for 12 years.

When Adrienne moved to Napier in 2008 she soon became involved in local activities taking her around the world and New Zealand as a tour guide, Art Deco tour guide, flowers for the Cathedral and being a grandmother to her 7 grandchildren. Adrienne is also now a keen "Cyco" after purchasing an e bike and has been a member of Rotary for 17 and a half years.

Paul was originally from a small town of Maxwell just out of Wanganui and lived on a beef and sheep farm.

Studied for a Sheep Diploma at Massey University and worked all around NZ as part of his studies.

While he was in Palmerston North he met Christabel.

In 1968 he set sail on the Australis to the UK with 6 young fellas sharing a cabin, they are all still good friends today.

He did sheep shearing in the UK and met up with Christabel again where they became engaged.

They came back to NZ via Rhodesia where he worked as an orderly and ambulance driver at a local hospital where Christabel worked.

After that trip they married and went back to Maxwell where they married.

They farmed in North Waikato for four years then moved to Hawkes Bay to Christabel's family farm where they had four children who grew up on that farm.

They then bought a farm in Puketitiri which remained their home for 16 years where they were both part of the local community.

After they sold their farm Paul became involved with work in the community and joined Rotary in 2009 when Glenn Roberts invited him along as a guest.

He has overseen many activities within our club and is a true unsung hero. Service above self.

Linda was born and bread in Eskdale. Originally a teacher Linda then tried out a few career changes by way of Marketing and communications, PR and Regional adviser for the Ministry of Social Development.

There won't be any big changes to the way things are run for the club – sticking to the adage – if it ain't broke – don't fix it.

Our major fundraisers will continue with Theatre Hawkes Bay and Little Theatre, and we may look at doing more of the quizzes here at East Pier – the last one being very successful. The telescope/binoculars bring us good pocket money and the raffle and sergeants sessions cover our administration costs.

We will continue to support our local community through beach clean ups and maintaining the walkway gardens when needed and the Ahuriri market day if they decide to have it this year! As well as supporting Salvation Army, Parkinsons NZ and the Red Cross appeals by providing collectors.

We will also support Tony's Trolley Derby at Art Deco and Nicola's MS Steps fundraiser. And our annual support of the Seafarers - donating to lonely sailors without their families at Christmas time.

Graeme still has the bit between his teeth when it come to the new foreshore playground which will cater for disabled children. And we will maintain the toy chest that continues to provide fun for children and families.

We are committed to sending two students to RYPEN - The Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment - for Youth Leadership and support the interact group at Sacred Heart and Rotoract at EIT.

Our rotary international support will continue with the "Give every child a future" vaccination programme in the Pacific, Interplast's free plastic surgery programme in Asia Pacific region, The End polio now programme, and providing Emergency Response Kits through ShelterBox to those in need around the world.

The Cycos will continue their weekly cycle,

We have two new potential projects this year. As well as providing Te Awa School with Dictionaries and Atlases, Lynn is working with the school on a garden project which will be designed to tell the history of Hawke's Bay. Watch this space.

And the second potential project came out of an online rotary training session I was on where the topic was - raising more money for the Rotary Foundation.

In my breakout room was a rotary lady from Fiji who said that their members had been hugely impacted by the Covid lockdowns and were hardly able to pay their fees let alone raise money for rotary international.

That got me thinking. These are our neighbours. We all rush to support the victims of the latest disaster or humanitarian crisis. We quickly forget about the people still struggling but invisible to the media. And I thought about Tonga.

It was the 15th of January this year when The Hunga-Tonga-Hunga-Ha'apai underwater volcano erupted causing a tsunami that flooded the coastlines of Tonga and covered many of its islands in ash. The explosion was literally heard here in Hawke's Bay.

86,000 people, which is 84% of the population of Tonga, were affected by the eruption and tsunami which destroyed vital infrastructure, crops and water supplies as well as family homes and businesses.

The MANGO community were taken off their island and are being relocated to another island and higher ground and the community of KANOKUPOLU is also being relocated.

I have been in contact with the NUKU'ALOFA Rotary Club – communication has been difficult, and they have been in a series of lockdowns. But they are looking to support projects in the reconstruction of the displaced communities and working with their government to see how they can make that happen.

I am hoping that we will be able to support them in a project – for example building a community facility or supporting the establishment of a school. But we will be guided by them. It would be an exciting undertaking which we could raise funds for and maybe travel to help support the project.

While there is a call for more diversity in Rotary – which I am all for, the reality is that not everyone has the time or resources to be part of Rotary. We are privileged in so many ways and I love that we can, through rotary, share what we have in the way of skills, resources and time with those who don't have the opportunities we have.

These projects don't just help others in our community and in our world, but they also help us to appreciate each other and understand the world a little better.

To reiterate what David said at the beginning of the evening, I have a quote from Harry Rogers from the Rotary Club of San Antonio who said at the rotary convention in 1927 "The Rotary Ideal is within us, and we realise, that when we are serving others, we are building ourselves."

Thank you all for being part of our Ahuriri Sunrise rotary family – whether a member or a supporter. You all make a difference. We can't change the whole world, but we can change the world of one person and the more people we help – the more worlds we've changed.
