John is celebrating his 50 year anniversary of his adventurous trip from Melbourne to London.

He and his friend Laurie, began the journey by driving to Adelaide, where they placed their car on a train – because in 1968 the Nullarbor Plain was no place for a lone car! – and arrived at Kalgoorlie, where they picked up their car and drove to Perth. They boarded an Italian ship with 2000 disgruntled passengers returning to Italy. A few days into the voyage, John and Laurie decided to leave the ship at Durban and find other transport.

First, they had to hitch-hike to Cape Town and took a couple of naïve risks on the way.

They were delighted to find passage on board a 700 passenger ship of mostly university students – mainly female! The ship cruised up the west coast of Africa making stops along the way until, at the Canary Islands, the crew went on strike and the voyage's progress was delayed a couple of days until grievances were sorted out. On to Barcelona, Mediterranean islands, Brindisi and embarking at Venice, the young men made a circuitous route across Europe before crossing the Channel via ferry to England.

Guest speaker: Ken Maher – Mexico and USA

Ken travelled with his wife, Helen, Helen's sister and her husband from 08.12.17 - 11.01.18. The group travelled together to visit Ken and Helen's son, Adam and his family, in Chihuahua, Mexico and to spend Christmas with them.

Ken and Co entered the USA at LA Airport and flew to New York via Dallas due to a medical emergency. From NY, they flew to New Orleans,

where they had a stop-over, and then on to Mexico

Some highlights of the visit to NY: Empire State Building, Macy's, Chrysler Building, The Highline, Guggenheim Museum, Central Park – where it snowed – Ground Zero and the Rockefeller Centre. They stayed in Greenwich Village and East Village.



Manhattan Island - New York City

In New Orleans they saw: Bourbon Street, listened to music at the Snugg Harbor Jazz Club, went on plantation tours, visited the above-ground cemetery, attended a football game and had a hurricane or 3 at Paddy O'Brien's fine establishment.

The Maher's went south of the border to Chihuahua Mexico; At 1500m above sea level and in the desert, it's a commercial centre for northern Mexico. In Chihuahua they did all the touristy stuff like visiting the Qunita Gameros house, the Governor's Palace and Hacienda de Pancho Villa.
