Guest Speaker



We had an interesting and informative guest speaker last week. Simone from. Landtasia Organic Farms. Simone told us how Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) and commercial food waste can be used to make a high quality humus rich compost suitable for use in organic food production.

Food and garden waste from the Palerang Council

City to Soil collection is bought to Lantasia's licensed composting site located between Braidwood and Bungendore. Each delivery is carefully hand sorted to remove any contamination. This takes a little time, but participants are very good at keeping contaminants out of the City to Soil collection. Once the material is sorted it enters the composting process.

Commercial food waste is delivered to the facility and carefully blended with other materials to create the perfect balance for composting. It takes approximately 6 months for the compost to reach maturity.

Learn about Rotary

Over the next few editions the Jerraganda will feature a short article about Rotary. The aim will be to educate new and older members alike on some of the things we hear about at Rotary meetings all the time. This week we look at the subject of the role of Assistant Governors

The office of assistant governor was created in 1996 as a key element of the District Leadership Plan, the organisational structure for all districts that was adopted by the RI Board in an effort to help district governors better support their clubs. Assistant governors are appointed by the district governor to assist in the administration of assigned clubs. These key Rotary leaders help incoming club presidents plan for their year and for the governor's official visit, advise clubs on strategies to achieve goals, and visit their assigned clubs at least four times a year.

In addition to providing more responsive support for clubs, assistant governors also form a pool of well-trained district leaders from which to select future governors. The assistant governor serves as an important resource for both the clubs and the district governor, helping to ensure that everything runs more smoothly within the district.
