# Directors Reports 10/07/1999

### **Report of Peter Crosby, President 1998 1999**

The Rotary Year was one in which our Nambour '76 club faced its difficulties, its sad and poignant times : responded in true Rotary maturedness, and moved on to assist our community Locally, at District level and Internationally.

With Lester and Peter being called to the "Order of Higher Rotary Service", we mere mortals will not forget their Rotary involvement, efforts, and fellowship, and as club members we were so fortunate to be enriched by their membership.

Our Club received from Rotary International, the World President's Citation for club participation and excellence in the Four Avenues of Service, signed by both the R.I. He was very vocal on the lack of Rotarians stepping up to accept the role of future club president. ### The Aitape Disaster Appeal was well covered in the speech given

by DG Henry and taking into account the magnitude of this disaster, together with prior board approval, our Rotary Club presented DG Henry with a cheque for \$2000.00, being our contribution towards overcoming this great human tragedy.

Whilst on the subject of International Aid ( to PNG ), out of our commission proceeds for the 4SS/Mix FM auction of \$1506.00, we sponsored two eye care nurses for PNG with our cheque for \$1000.00.

Nambour '76 Rotarians, their families, and friends certainly set the benchmark when it comes to Youth. The young people of today are tomorrow's Rotarians, tomorrow's parents, tomorrow's civic leaders. As per the report by Youth Director Bruce Lawton, ours is a busy programme catering for the brilliant, the struggler, and the less fortunate. We sent home Gui Silva earlier in the Rotary year to Brazil, we farewelled Beth Stevenson (daughter of Rotarian John and Alison Stevenson) for twelve months to Richlands, USA, and then at District Conference in March, we received our current inbound exchange student Takaaki "Futta" Furutani from Japan for his stay with us.

For the twentieth year, our club hosted the Sunshine Coast Special Schools Swimming Carnival. Over two hundred of these disadvantaged kids participated. Again, our club answered the call to provide the BBQ lunch for many disabled and intellectually handicapped people from "Cross Roads", supported by the Uniting Church pastoral care. On the subject of community support, our club presented a cheque for \$500.00 to St Vincent de Paul and \$500.00 to the Salvation Army for their Community Welfare work, and \$500.00 to the Rotary Health Research Fund to assist with cancer research. Further, our club sent \$2000.00 to Rotary International to support the Rotary Foundation and its world wide work.

The highlight of this Rotary year was the presentation of a Paul Harris Recognition Award to Gordon Downing. Gordon, you bring dignity to the list of similar Awardees. Indicative of our club strength, the numbers attending the District Conference and the District Assembly are certainly a credit when viewed in the light of tough business conditions.

The Sundale Constitution matters have finally been resolved in the form of a recently ratified new constitution, adopting matters relating to our club membership on the Sundale Board, being of similar thrust to our club's stand.

During the Rotary year, I felt honoured that our club bestowed the role of "Protector of our Charter" upon my shoulders. My appreciation and thanks I offer to the Rotary Board and Rotarians for their support throughout the year. I have endeavoured to do the bidding of the club as a whole, and to this end, the advice, and loyalty of our full membership will be remembered for a long time to come. Marilyn and I are very grateful for the support from our club and club friends during the stressful cancer operation and treatment procedure. We both thank you all for the well wishes and kind gestures. ### **International Service**

The major function that the International Committee was involved in was the Youth Exchange Weekend organised in conjunction with the Nambour and Woombye-Sunrise Clubs. There were a large number of consignments sent to Bill Waterfield at Donations in Kind. The new address seems to be working well. Such things as computers, books, pharmaceuticals were despatched over the year, and now we have the promise from Bill for 5 Computers to send to Vietman for Bede Evans. The transport has yet to be organised.

Bede Evans visited the Club in May to give us a most interesting presentation on his experiences and work in Aquaculture in Vietnam. Many "76" people rallied to donate a large amount of clothing for him to take back to the local population in his area. Additionally there is a quantity of text books to go to Vietnam when transportation can be arranged. These will be sent with the promised Computers.

One of the highlights of our year has been the arrival of Ginger Bandoni our Ambassadorial Scholar from California, US., who is studying at UQ. She is hosted by Reg and Cathy Wheeler who are her Counsellors.

The Club sent ten Kits for Kids to the Solomon Islands, thanks to the good folk at Squiggles in Nambour, who gave us a most competetive price. These kits contain learning materials for the school age children in the Solomons.

A large consignment of material remnants, wools, cottons, threads, needles and other sewing items were despatched to the Rotary Club of Boroko PNG for the Lady Carol Kidu Project which aims to teach sewing skills to PNG women. Thanks are due to Bob Smyth, the Salvation Army and Meg White for their contributions to this project.

Rotary Foundation donations were given to Polio Plus (\$2500), and the Annual Programs Fund (\$2300). This has enabled a number of Paul Harris Fellows to be recognised.

Our Youth Exchange Student, Thibaud leaves us on July 8 to return to the Bordeaux region of France where he will probably learn to imbibe the red stuff at last! He has been a quiet and well behaved young man who has been most content in being part of all the four host families involved. A word of thanks should go to the McVeans, Turners, Bruces and Stevensons, as well as the Counsellors - the Trinders, for making T-Bo's stay enjoyable. During the year, the Club decided not to be involved with Youth Exchange over the next 12 months.

In finalising this report, it should be noted that a large part of the "International" year involves the Foundation, and in this fact the Club has been particularly blessed with the untiring work of Bob Sellars.
